Dear Mr. Weisberg,

When I received your letter last week I wanted to rush out and write you back right away because your letter was so nice. Beautiful actually. A letter like that is really inspiring. I didn't though because I wanted to wait until I could send you a down payment on the books. That's the only way I can afford to buy them and I'd like to have them very much. I'll send \$5 a week to you if that's alright.

I think many more people are skeptical about the Warren Commission and the "lone assassin" theory than you may imagine and they don't even know alot of the facts. Just about everyone I speak to feels it wasn't

a one man job. It's a shame people don't carry it further and investigate a bit more. But as you say people are scared of the truth and in this case the truth is a pretty awesome thing I just wish every American could read 'Whitewash'. It would shake them up to say the least. It's really so upsetting to see things like that going on and nobody seemingly cares.

The James Earl Ray business is upsetting too because it has conspiracy written all over it. What do you think of it? Do you see connections?

About my address, this is my work address. I'm working at this military place (hotel, club, restaurant etc) in this news stand-bookstore type of place. And then I go to the Uni. of Maryland at night. The most worthwhile thing about the school is I've had the same professor for sociology

and criminology and he's read all your books and is really informed on it all. He said last time he was in the States he tried to locate you but couldn't find your place. He too would be interested in reading your yet unpublished books.

Actually I could understand very well what you meant about the writing part comes easily. Course I've never written a book but like for term papers (ones that I feel and get very involved in) and some newspaper writings. Research is always the most difficult and time consuming but usually it's the most interesting part as well.

Although I generally don't read a lot of English papers (mostly American) I'll try to more and see what they have to say on the subject.

What do you think will happen with Jim Harrison now? Will he be able to carry it further do you think?

I try and express myself verbally to people as much as I can. People tend to listen because I don't look radical. I mention this because it's a funny kind of thing about people. My brothers look radical and people try to rule them out before they say anything. That makes for difficult communication. I was thirteen at the time of the assassination and it seemed so fishy at that ~~time~~ time. People seem to take relief in the lone assassin theory. Peoples readiness to convict him amazed me because at the time I wasn't sure he was even involved ^(in the actual shooting) Anyway...

I'll enclose another self addressed envelope in case the payment has to be made all at once or whatever. If it should be alright to do this and after I receive the books, if you'd like me to visit any publishers and just see if there is any possible interest in publishing your books

I'd be glad to do it. If there was the slightest interest I'd write you and let you contact them (I wouldn't do anything to harm your chances - merely act as a feeler) No doubt you must think I'm a bit unusual to make such a suggestion but your books are important and should be read. I'll enclose a picture so you can see I'm all here. (human + all)

And again thank you so much for your wonderful and inspiring letter. I hope you never feel discouraged about what you are doing. It's great. It restores my faith in the ideals of pursuing truth in the face of such overwhelming suppression. For this I again say my admiration is all yours.

Hope things are going along well.
