'A MINORITY REPORT'

Commission says that Lee Harvey Oswald, working alone, killed President Kennedy.

This discussion is, largely, an emphatic and often hotly argued rebuttal to the Commission's findings. It begins with "the only way you can believe the Warren Report is to not read it" and ranges through charges of incompetence on the part of the Dallas police and destruction and misrepresentation of evidence by the FBI; and accusations of carelessness, as well as suppression of evidence and testimony, on the part of the Commission.

Panelists: Mark Lane, hired as counsel to protect the dead Oswald's interests by Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, is

the author of "Rush to Judgment." Journalist Leo Sauvage has written "The Oswald Affair." Harold Weisberg recently published "Whitewash: The Report on the Warren Report." Editor Penn Jones wrote "Forgive My Grief." Historian Jacob Cohen calls himself "by and large . . . a defender of the Commission." Syndicated columnist Jim Bishop is the moderator.
