## Post Names Editorial Page Editor

Philip L. Geyelin, Pulitzer Prize-winning editor of The Washington Post editorial page, will take a sabbatical year to research and write a book on President Carter's conduct of foreign policy.

Meg Greenfield, deputy editor of the page and Newsweek columnist, will become editor of the editorial page, Post publisher Donald E. Graham announced.

Geyelin won the Pulitzer Prize for editorial writing in 1970. The prize was awarded him for general excel-

lence of his editorials during the previous year. He joined The Post in 1968. Before joining The Post, Geyelin was with the Wall Street Journal for 20 years as a diplomatic correspondent in the U.S. and abroad. He will return to The Post in a different capacity at the end of his sabbatical, Graham said.

Greenfield won the Pulitzer Prize for editorial writing in 1978. She came to the Post in 1969 from The Reporter magazine, where she had been a staff writer and Washington bureau chief.
