Dear Ms. McGroary,

First I must be honest with you. After I read the enclosed Nicaragua story in the local paper I phoned the Post, spoke to the foreign desk and was referred to John Goshko. I read him the marked quote from Ambassador Metlon to this Congressional delegation sent by the White House. It states explicitly that the Reagan administration's intent is to "overthrow" the Nicaraguan government. Today's Post has almost a page, Goshko ~~is~~ filed about a column and a half, and there is nothing other than the Reagan administration's line in the paper.

Mrs. Byron has been widely quoted but not a single word attributed to her even indicates what Metlon told her and the others. Moreover, there was a State guide from Washington present, so State was well aware of this I think arrogant and stupid bit of atypical honesty.

Although it was safe enough in Managua for Mrs. Byron to go jogging, State has spent tax money for bullet-proof vans to taken these delegations around in.

This White House picked delegation left Friday, July 8 and was home Sunday, July 10. What a thorough inspection!

And the embassy took the delegation, sans the women, to where violence was expectable. What a thing Reagan would have had if anyone of the delegation had been injured!

It really looks as though the whole thing was planned to coincide with this announced demonstration.
