Whenever things get tough in America, we start making jokes. It doesn't make the problem go away, but it makes it easier to live with. And that's the way things are going now, as the American sense of humor begins to exert itself.

A joke going around: "Have you heard the new loyalty oath: 'Are you now or have you ever been a member of the Committee For the Re-election Of the President?'"

A bumper sticker: "IMPEACHMENT WITH HONOR."

Milton Berle's gag: "I overheard two men talking on the presidential yacht. One of them said, 'Please say we're going north — don't say we're going up the river.'"

At the Emmy awards, Johnny Carson said: "I haven't heard so much credit given to others since James McCord."

Jack Carter's gag: "I hope Nixon won't be impeached — then we'd have Sinatra for president."

Jack Burns and Avery Schreiber are coming out with a comedy album about Watergate. Sample bit:
