Dear Mr. Davis:

In commemoration of the Kennedy assassination, you broadcast an interview with Malcolm Kilduff about which I immediately phoned you. You invited me down to tape an answer and I went to your office for this purpose immediately. Between the time of the phone call and the few minutes it took me to go the four blocks that separated us, you changed your mind.

I then called Mr. Kilduff and had a lengthy conversation with him. Thereafter we had a number of phone conversations, for he told me that if he looked into it and found he was in error he would ask you for time to withdraw what he said as it applied to me. In pursuance of this, I offered Mr. Kilduff unrestricted access to all of the research behind all of my writings. I have now written four parts of my "Report on the Warren Report", three of which I have published. The fourth will be out soon.

Time passes and Mr. Kilduff has not done what he said he would.

I am therefore writing to request equal time on the same facilities to make response. I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. Kilduff. If he elects to do what he said he would, I will withdraw this request.
