Dear Harold:

There is no time now to answer your good letter of Oct. 19, but I can report that Hal is back. Actually he got back on Oct. 21, to find his firm was laying off people, including himself. He tells us this situation soon was clarified to the extent that he could not hope to be taken back until the first of next year, if then, because of the general business slump. He says, and we believe him, that his trip to Europe had nothing to do with it, that he would have been laid off anyway.

We had begun trying to reach him by telephone beginning around the 15th, and did not manage to do so until last Monday, Nov. 2. Ha had been out looking for work, of course, and not finding it.

In any case we arranged to go over to Oakland last night, where we took him to dinner and cleared up a few things, although not many.

He had a wonderful time in Europe, this is clear. He met Cheryl in Munich, they rented a car and drove down through Switzerland, along the French and Italian Riverias to Genoa, then back up through Verfica, Insbruck and Salzburg and back to Munich.
