I do not send you this in expectation of anything. I did send you the first affidavit, which pretty much exposes those awful people doing awful things, but they got even more incredible, they tried to lie their way out of lying to the court, without Jim's having made any use of that affidavit at all.

In a terrible sense it is amusing and who knows, perhaps someday you may find use for something like it in a novel. Imagine the woman who was chief of ~~operations~~ staff for the CIA's so-called Directorate of Operations, the dirty tricksters, swearing ~~on their honor~~ of "personal knowledge" that disclosure of what had been disclosed, the plots against Castro, "would result in exceptionally grave damage to the national security because to officially acknowledge these plans would disrupt foreign relations vitally affecting the national security." We haven't had any relations with Cuba since the last Eisenhower administration days.

Just before going to bed last night I wrote George and after that a possible lead that would indicate to him what I had in mind. This kind of thing lends itself to his great talent for ridicule and I do hope it appeals to him. And his desk.

I'm also sending this copy because I asked you to give the earlier one to Jack's associate who was supposedly working on something with Mark Allen. Unless there is a conference between the Houses (I'm assuming House passage tomorrow from the early indication I hope Lesar has had a chance to alter, he's been trying hard) there is no possibility of any use saving us from the ACLU/CIA goodies. But there is always the possibility that if George doesn't do anything Jack may see some later use.
