Relet 11/2, thus far my work on FRAME-UP is up to date, but publisher's isn't. I am hoping he will get me a copy of Keiser through Dutton, which is to distribute my book. I have a favorable impression from the condensation and the suppression. On the autopsy Wecht was also there. I am therefore satisfied with it, more so because of the gangup on Noguchi after it.

I was not familiar with the Sherrill you quote. That is rather interesting and important. That such things existed I knew from my OSS days, where I had some of our training manuals, prepared in the office in which I worked at the beginning..

In odds and ends of moments I have been going over Newman. It is even worse than you said. However, it has some negative values that I think will be important to me. In considering the effluvia he has solidified, it has forced me to consider things that had escaped me before. In short, think about his undeviating error has led me to think as I have not before in some areas.

But I'm so bogged down in so much work, I cannot check these things out as I come to them. I can only hope that I can remember them for the future.
