I met St. George in the Washington office of Ben Spiegel last summer. He said he was going to look me up but hasn't. I am not certain of his connections, but I think he was on the exile side when the CIA cut them off. As I recall it, he does have an accent.

Matter of fact, the Agency had more than one office in N.O. I do not know how many, but I believe more than two. Garrison talked about this but never went into it. They also had a Double-Check office there.
