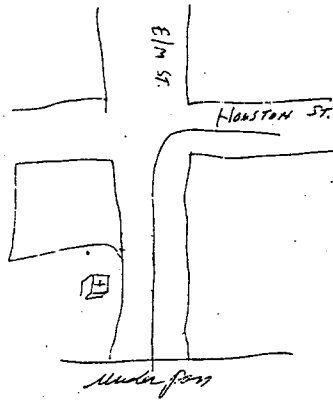

FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

Date: 2/15/64

Sergeant PATRICK T. DEAN, Patrol Division, Dallas Police Department, advised that on March 24, 1964, at about 4:45 AM, PATRY PAIR, City Hall Night Telephone Operator, called him at his office saying she had a collect call from a SAUCE SIMPSON, Victoria, Canada, and that SIMPSON wanted to talk to someone about the assassination of President KENNEDY. Sergeant DEAN stated there was a discussion as to whether they should accept the call and PATRY PAIR said to talk to SIMPSON and the Victoria, Canada, operator, she felt that SIMPSON had some information and that it would be worthwhile to accept the collect call.

Sergeant DEAN stated he authorized the operator to accept the collect call and SIMPSON said he was in Dallas on November 29, 1963, and took some pictures of the President's car at his home in the back of the house. According to the Dallas Police Department, Sergeant DEAN stated that SIMPSON claimed he had not had the film developed and did not know exactly what was in the photographs.

SIMPSON stated he had been talking to his attorney, MATTHEW (phonetic) and that MATTHEW had instructed him to contact the Dallas Police Department. Sergeant DEAN stated that SIMPSON claimed he had not had the film developed and did not know exactly what was in the photographs.

Sergeant DEAN stated he told SIMPSON that he should contact the President's Commission in Washington, D. C., and send the pictures to them, but that SIMPSON was stated he would mail contact the President's Commission. SIMPSON stated he would mail the film to him (Sergeant DEAN) airmail on March 25, 1964.

Sergeant DEAN advised that PATRY PAIR, the nightstand operator, contacted BENJAMIN WILLIAMS, of the Victoria, British Columbia, Telephone Company, to trace this call and, through this person, it was ascertained the call had been placed from telephone number 264-3780. He stated this phone number was previously registered to R. S. V. SIMPSON, 1141 Columbia, Victoria, British Columbia.

Sergeant DEAN stated he would immediately contact the Dallas FBI Office on receipt of this film.

Under date of March 24, 1964, the Seattle Office advised that Corporal R. S. S. RACROUSE, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Victoria, British Columbia, had on that date interviewed SAUCE SIMPSON WILLIAMS, 1141 Columbia Street, Victoria, British Columbia, who admitted making the telephone call to the Dallas Police Department on March 24, 1964. He also admitted using a fictitious name, claimed he had never been to Dallas, Texas, and had no film of the assassination of President KENNEDY. The Seattle Office advised that the only reason SIMPSON could give for making the telephone call was that he had been watching a television program and had been drinking and decided to make the call. According to Corporal RACROUSE, SIMPSON is "given to dreams". SIMPSON's last employment was in connection with the demolition of buildings.

SUMMARY OF INVESTIGATION

Reference is made to previous reports relative to Lee Harvey Oswald.

Dallas Investigation
On 11-29-63 the following was reported to SAH Forrest V. Gervais, by Guyville Will Smith, Dallas Police Department.

Lee Harvey Oswald in the first interview subsequent to his arrest, stated that he was leaving the Texas School Book Depository Building, one day with a new call but interrupted him at the front entry identified themselves as Secret Service Agents and asked for the location of a telephone.

On 1-24-64 Mr. Sam Brink, Detective, Dallas Police Department, stated that he had interviewed Mr. James Powell, Army Intelligence, who was trapped inside the Texas School Book Depository after the Depository doors had been sealed.

On 1-28-64 Mr. Powell was interviewed relative to his location at the time of the assassination and his actions subsequent to the assassination. Mr. Powell stated that he had been watching the parade from a position near the corner of Houston and Elm Streets, the side of the intersection. Mr. Powell stated further that he heard the shot and he then joined a group of Sheriff's Deputies, who were looking toward the front of the Texas School Book Depository at the time of information that the assassin had shot from the adjacent tower. 
