## DETAITS:

The following investigation supplements that contained on Pagas 1 to 15 in the report of Splecial Agent JANRS J. O'CONNOR dated December 31, 1963, at Mami, Florida, captioned, "TEE FAByEY OSWAED, Ake.; IS - R - CUBA," In that report, investigation was set out reflecting that on or about November 1,1963 , an unidentified male made remarks to an employee at the parrot Jungle, a tourist attraction ot Miami, Morida, which remarks led the employee to believe the unknom male was acquainted with LEE FARVEY OSWALD. This unidentifted male was said to have mede reference to President Kemady, and "shooting between the eyes," and that he had a friend who was an Anerican, a Markist, and was a sharpshooter and could speak several languages, including Russian. The Parrot Jungle employee related that the unicientifted male, in one instance, referred to his friend by the name "Las," and remarked that the friend was either In Temas or Mexico.

On Narch 6, 1964, Mrs. LILLIAN SPINCDER, the Perrot Jungle employee who previously furnished the inforaetion concerning the afore-described unidentified male, contacted the Mami Office of the FBI to advise that the unidentified individual had returned to the Parrot Jungie on that date and was observed by her to drive a blue and white Chevrolet bearing 1964 Florida license 1-143874. Mrs. SPINGLER said that Mrs. IV ITSON, who operates the ticket booth at the Parrot Jungle and speaks Spanish, as certained that the unidentified male's name was MRTINEZ.


Records of the Dace County, Florida, Aucombile Registretion Ofince rezlect that 1964 Rloaida Zicence 1-143874, was issued to j0rge sono marcimez, 464 N. 巴. 31st Street, Mami, Florida, for a 1954 Chevrolet fow-doo:.

On March 16, 1904, Wrs. AMNU RISAER, 464 R. E. 31st Scrout, Miami, scated she recalled Joned MArumez as a tenamt in one of her apartmente, for a period of about a yeaz, until tpproximately 1953. She said she did not know his current residence, but recalled that he worleed at the FontaineblonHotel in Mami Beach. She said she did not know any of his associates, and that he resided alone, although she understood he had been married.

On Warch 17, 1964, Wiss Rave Bourbiau, Zersomel OEfice, Zontainebleau Hotel, Whai Beech, advised thet JORGE MARTHEL Tas currencly employed as a bell oy at the hotel, and had begum employnent with the hotel on JuIy 14, 1961. His record indicated thote he had worked for the Cubbin Customs Service in Gube during the period Octover, 1949, to March, 1959. She stated that MARTMES's adtress was 711 S . W. 5 ch Street, Mami, H1crida, and that his Social securfiey Number was 262-70-6632. His employment references were reflected as MCEABI J. WCLANEY, casine gwer, onow, three yeare; JIM BYRBS, Transportetion Manager, pin you ndic..ad; BMMIO GOREIA, property owner, place not indtrenet; and, MGUSI A. GARCIA, Manager of the iight Company in Cuba.

Inquiny conducted at 711 S . W. 5th Street, resulted in learning that JoReZ K-hweZ was not known se that adress.

On March 18, 1964, Miss KAY BOURBEAU, Personnel Office, Fontainebleau Hotel, advised that the inquiry made of JORG MARTINEZ resulted in obtaining his current address as 301 N. E. 62 nd Street, MIami, Florida.

On March 17, 1964, record at the office of U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, Miam, Flomida, Number A11 873416 , pertaining to Jorce motro ammez SOTO reFlected that he was bom on Tebruary 15,2528 , in Havana, Cuba. Ee had been granted a Ü. S. resident visa at the U. S. Embassy, Havana, on June 28, 1960, and arrived at Miami via Pan American Aisways on Juiy 21, 1960. His sponsor for immigration into the United states, wio furnished an affidavit promising employment Eleep of MARTINEZ, was indicated as NICMAEE J. HCLANEY, 4855 Pine Tree Drive, Miami Beach, Florida.

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JORGR ANEOWTO MARTOALZ SCTO voluntarily appeared at the Miani Office of che WBI in anower to a telephone call placed to him at the Fontaincbleau Hotel on Narch 22 , 1964. MARTENEZ said he is knom as ESORGE MREMKEZ, and he felt he had sufficient compehenston of Taglish to permit conduct of the incervien in the Engitsh language.

Marrinuz satd he has on cocasions in the past token visitors in his persomal car to courist attractious in the Mianf area, including the pazrot Jungle. He reculted the occastori on or about November 1, 3S63, when he took tourtacs to the Parrot Jumgle, and while there angaged in conversation with the employees the the gift shop and displayed his ability to write with both hands simultaneousiy. During intervien, he exhibited this ability by writing his mame; jores MARTINEZ, with botis hands simultaneousiy.

NE. MARETMEZ stated that he had no persomal acguaintanceship wLih, or knowledge of, LEE HARVES OSWAZD. He said that if the Razrot Jungle employee thought be had expressed an association or acguaintanceship with CSHAED, chis misunderstanding on the part of the employee wust have resulted from his poor promunclation of English, and lack of gramatical correctness. We stated thet, in fact, he knew no one with the Eirst mame IES , and was at a loss to understand how the employee mighe have obeained this misunderstanding. He said, likewise, he kad no friend located either In Texas or Mexico, and that the incident of his having allegedly spoicen fin this sense was completely errancous

Mrtmez stated that the does regard himself as exciccile, and particularly so wi.... wegard to the control of Cuba by FIDEL CASTRO, and that he may have made some remaris related to castro whach were mistnterpreted by the Parrot Jungle employee as di. uted toward President Jom

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F. KENNEDY. Fe said he vaguely recalled having spoken about CAS2RO and the Cuban situation. Me said, by way of explaining remarks attributed to him by the Parrot Jungle employee, that he way have said that the wished he were in Washington, or that he wore the president of the United States so that he could exercise the power to blow up FIDEL CASTRO. MARMTMEZ said he may also dave expressed some displeasure at what he regards as the failure of the United States to rid Cuba of CASTRO, but tit was not a criticism of the United States Government, which he considers to be the best in the world. WMranz denied that he would have made any such statement as "shooting between the eyes of President REMNEDY, " and explained that if he made any such references, is bundimast certainly have been with respect to FIDEL CASTRO.

WARTMNE stated that the is acquainted with to one whom he knows to be aU. S. citizen and Marxist, or such an individual who had served in the U. S. Armed Forces. He stared that he, himself, species Spanish and broken English, and no other language, and he does not have any friend or acquaintance who can speak che Russian language. MARTINEZ said that, Inkewise, he could that. of no acquaintane whom he knew to be a marksman or shazpshooter, and he added that if he had made some wreath of this nature to the Parrot Jungle employee, it was w questionably in reference to the means by which he would like to see RIDEL CASTRO eliminated.

MARTMREZ said he did not recall what may have prompted him to talk along these general lines during his visit to the Parrot Jungle, but possibly some development

in the Cuban situation had recentiy occurted which could have upset him. Ke said that te was incredtble that anyone should thinik that he would have any relationship with a pro-CASTRO person, because, in fact, he has only hate for CASTRO sympachizers. Te related that he was employed in the Mnistry of Himance in Cuba as of 1949, and continued in that department uncil the begimatng of 1959, at which time he was the Customs Inspector in Charge of Havana Harbor and the Colombia Air Base near Havana. He suid he was economically comfortable, in that he was earning $\$ 900.00$ a month as of 1959 , and resided rent free in a $\$ 40,000.00$ home in Kavana which belonged to his amm, and which he would eventualiy inkerit.

MARTENEZ contimued that his former fathez-inlaw, CARLOS RUWOz, was a goverment admintstrator duting the regime of Cuban President CARIOS PRIO, and it was through PUJOL that MARMTMEZ owiginally obtained employment in 1049 in the Ministry of Finance.

He said that his om father, ANHONHO MARTMEL PEREZ ABREU, had been a successenl and weli-w-do attorney in Cuba prior to the advent of FiDEZ CASERO to power, but had since lost his properties through confiscation by the CASTRO regime. Ke said he did not know the whereabouts of his facher, although the latear might still be in Cuba. We said that his cher, CARMEA SOTO URQUZZA, hed divorced his
 lost a lazge anount of income property in Cubc yo the Cuban Govemment. He said his mother and step-father contimue to live in Cuba.


MARTHEZ said thet his wife, COMCEPCION LUESA CORTES MADRAZO, had cone to the unfeed States with him in July, 1960, but they have since separated and are contemplating divorce.

MARTMEE stated that his fomigration into the United States was sponsored by MICKAEL ROLAMEY, who had operated the casino in the Nectowal Fiotel in favana before tire Government of FIDEL C.STRO closed down such operations. MARTENEZ said that when he lost his job in the Cuban Customs Service in the Eirst pare of 1959, when the CASTRO Goverment removed the pre-CASmo porsomel. he, KARTHNEZ, worked for McZAMEY at the casino in the gear eral capacity of handling Spanish-speaking clients. He said that as of July, 1900, the reached the decision that he could no longet accept the westrictions of freedon being imposed by the CASTRO regtme, and decided to move to the United States. He said that very shortly after arrivel, he began employment at the Fontainebleau hotel at Kitami Beach as a "trumez," handing cars, and with the exceptlon of about three or four weeks during 1960 when he worked at a motel on the 79th Street Causeway, Miani Deach, he has been steadily employed at the roneainebleau.

MAzNHEZ stated that he is a gracuate of the Relen College $i n$ Cuba, and had studled law for one year at the Universtty of Havana. He said he had not joined the fozees which engaged in the Cuben invasion of Aprin, 195I, but subsequently volunceered for training in the Cuban unit of the United States Army, but was not accepted, possibly because he was overage. He stated he has never:
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
