I find I and reference in Commission staff papers to FBI interviews with Bill Alexander that the Archives claims not to have. Do you know enything about this?

Strangely (or is this the wrong word?), I have found no reference to any FEI interview with Sweatt on this. Do you have anything from him, from whatever source? I seem to remember from my own choos stories that the report originated with Sweatt in one version and Alexander in another. From the accounts of Alexander's belief Oswald was part of a Communist conspirecy, it would seem unlikely he also believed him a federal agent, unless he were extremely extremist in this thinking. Have you any opinion?

Did any of you ever follow the Tarsikes story, he telling the SS she recognized a man in the NO TV footege? The SS seems to have dropped that pretty fast, about as soon as they learned she stacked up as a dependable observer particularly good at pictures/faces.
