This is in reply to your letter of law I ture.

If you will specify the Warren Commission documents to which you refer as "the well-known, the published, some documents I've seen in the past," relating to the spectrographic and neutron activation analysis of Commission evidence, we shall be pleased to receive your request for copies of these documents. Your attorney, Mr. Lesar, was requested to specify any relevant documents of which he was aware, and copies of all specific documents that he mentioned, as well as others, were furnished to him. We do not have the FBI laboratory records concerning the spectrographic analysis of evidence referred to in the testimony of Robert Frazier in the Commission's Hearings (Vol. V, p. 69) or similar detailed laboratory records for the neutron activation analysis of the evidence. We would be pleased to make records of the Commission available to you in the National Archives to search for any documents in which you are interested.

Your letter of May 14, which confirmed your oral request for copies of all documents released since the last regular review, does not mention confirming an oral request for copies of all CIA documents released since 1970. Copies of these documents will be sent to you as soon as they can be prepared.

We are not aware of any documents in our custody relating to the interception of Oswald's mail by the CMA.
