SECURITY MARKINGS

Classification Markings

Any information generated on a DoD contract, or from data controlled by the DoD which would adversely affect the United States' safety or defense if known to unauthorized persons, must be classified in the categories and manner described below.

TOP SECRET

This classification is assigned to information or material of paramount importance, the unauthorized disclosure of which could result in exceptionally grave damage to the nation, such as leading to a war, a definite break in diplomatic relations affecting the defense of the United States, a compromise of scientific or technological developments vital to national defense, etc. The stamp appearing below must be centered at top and bottom of a document, in letters $\frac{1}{4}$ inch high, preferably in RED.

T O P S E C R E T

SECRET

This classification is assigned to information or material, the unauthorized disclosure of which could result in serious damage to the nation, such as jeopardizing international relations of the United States, endangering a program of vital importance to the national defense, compromising defense plans or scientific or technological developments important to national defense, etc. The stamp appearing below must be centered top and bottom of each page of a document in letters of $\frac{1}{4}$ inch, preferably in RED.

S E C R E T

CONFIDENTIAL

This classification is assigned to information or material, the unauthorized disclosure of which could be prejudicial to the defense interests of the nation. The stamp appearing below must be centered top and bottom of each page of a document in letters of $\frac{1}{4}$ inch high, preferably in RED.

C O N F I D E N T I A L

Classification Markings (Con't.)

CONFIDENTIAL - "Modified Handling Authorized"

This marking is assigned to CONFIDENTIAL information for which less stringent transmission and storage rules are applicable. The stamp appearing below must appear at top and bottom of each page of a document in letters $\frac{1}{4}$ inch high, preferably in RED.

Extra Markings

In addition to the classification categories above, the classified information or material must also be designated as being Defense Information or as Restricted Data information.

RESTRICTED DATA
Atomic Energy Act - 1954

All other classified data not falling within the Restricted Data definition is Defense Information.

- b. The following extra marking must appear at least once on the cover or first page, as appropriate, of each document containing Defense Information which is generated for distribution outside the DoD contracting agency.

HANDLING CLASSIFIED DATA

GENERAL

Dependent upon the degree of protection required in the interest of national defense, information is classified TOP SECRET, SECRET, CONFIDENTIAL, or CONFIDENTIAL - "Modified Handling Authorized."

All authorized persons having custody of classified matter when it is not in approved storage containers shall keep it under constant surveillance and be in a physical position to exercise direct control over it. Such persons shall cover classified material, turn it face down, place it in storage containers, or otherwise protect it when unauthorized persons are present; and they shall return all classified data to storage containers as soon as practicable after use.

Combination padlocks used for storage containers shall be locked after removal from the container, to prevent possible compromise of the combination.

Terms such as CRYPTOGRAPHIC INFORMATION, RESTRICTED DATA, and FORMERLY RESTRICTED DATA are not security classifications, but designate types of classified information which require special handling.

Foreign Travel

AMC Form 159, Notifications of Foreign Travel, is required from any person with TOP SECRET, SECRET, or CONFIDENTIAL Access Authorization who plans to travel to any country except Canada or Mexico.

If the foreign travel is to or through a Sino-Soviet Bloc country, or involves attendance at an international scientific technical, engineering, or professional meeting outside the United States when it can be anticipated that Sino-Soviet Bloc representatives will attend, the employee must notify Industrial Security at least thirty (30) days in advance; furnish necessary information about the travel, and acknowledge receipt of a security briefing from the Industrial Security Office.

Cryptographic Material

Cryptographic material, regardless of its classification, will be reproduced only with the prior written authorization of the Contracting Officer, or his authorized representative.

Reproduction records for cryptographic material will be maintained for a minimum of four (4) years.
