In our continuing effort to measure the work output of the various units of this section, there follows a brief review of the significant accomplishments:

During the month of April, 1978, the Projects Unit reviewed a total of 32,431 pages, which, although slightly below the average of 156 pages per day in March, was compensated for by the training of additional assistants. In connection with file reviews and making appropriate markings in auxiliary files, 160 addenda were prepared.

The Policy Unit presented six training sessions, during which 125 employees were trained as relates to document security procedures. Sixteen personnel were briefed, while 1,940 documents were reviewed for classification purposes. In addition, 215 "Top Secret" documents were controlled.

The Congressional Inquiry Unit carried over a pending 27 requests in the Kennedy/King assassinations, while receiving 22 new requests during the month. The unit was able to process 28 requests during the month, leaving 21 pending.

The Review Unit presented approximately 65 appeals to the Department Review Committee, of which 55 matters were adjudicated. In addition, approximately 580 documents were reviewed in connection with classification matters at the National Archives.

The Special Case Review Unit reviewed 194 sections, for which approximately 44,000 pages were Xeroxed. One trip to Chicago has been averaged per week, while the pending work is estimated to be approximately 504 sections. These reviews concern the major American Civil Liberties Union and National Lawyers' Guild civil litigations.

Memorandum to Mr. Bassett . Re: Monthly Statistics Document Classification and Review Section

The Special Projects Review Unit reviewed 425 sections in addition to a significant number of newspapers and publications in connection with the Socialist Workers Party suit. Further, personnel of this unit expended ten manpower days in connection with weekend work of the Congressional Inquiry Unit.

Based on data furnished by the Records Section, 115,341 name check forms were received at FBI Headquarters during April, 1978. Of these forms, approximately 42,000 were directly handled by review clerks and analysts of the Executive Branch Agencies Unit. For these forms, approximately 12,000 files were received for review purposes; 1,472 copies of reports were disseminated to appropriate agencies; 1,700 file references were made, while 230 memoranda were prepared by analysts. The remaining approximately 38,000 forms were determined to be "No Record" as a result of file reviews conducted by this unit. It is to be noted the remaining approximately 73,000 forms were returned to the mail room of this unit where "No Record" stamps were affixed to the forms which were sorted and returned to the submitting agencies. As indicated previously, the transfer of this latter activity is undergoing review with the Records Section personnel involved.

A detailed review of each of the units' accomplishments can be referred to by a copy of the individual unit's report attached hereto.

There follows a brief review of the significant accomplishments of captioned section for the month of May, 1978:

The Projects Unit reviewed a total of 32,379 pages, preparing 174 addends. In addition to the above, the Unit Chief and other Agents were involved in training programs, attending assessment schools, conferences or on administrative (noving) leave. The accomplishments compare directly with those for the month of April, 1975.

The Policy Unit presented seven training sessions, during which 105 personnel were trained in document security procedures. Fifty-four personnel were briefed, while 2,059 documents were reviewed for elassification purposes. In addition, 305 "Top Secret" documents were controlled.

The Congressional Inquiry Unit earried ever a pending 21 requests in the Kennedy/King assassinations, while receiving 41 new requests during the month. The unit processed 21 requests, leaving a total of 41 pending. Due to the volume of requests, leaving a total of 41 pending. Due to the volume of work being handled by this unit, several personnel were leaned to it from other areas of the section and division.

The Review Unit presented approximately 30 appeal matters to the Department Review Counittee (DRC), while 17 matters were adjudicated during the month. Appropriate memomatters were prepared to report the adjudications. In addition, 266 serials were reviewed by analysts in counsection with appeal matters, while 3,387 pages were reviewed in connection with elassification matters at the Mational Archives. Several documents involved in the Gray, Felt and Miller matter were also presented to the DRC.



Dear Judge Webster:

In my telephone conversation today with Mr. Notis, I offered to forward a letter to you describing the position of my client, Special Agent James P. Hosty, Jr., with respect to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's forthcoming appearance before the Nouse of Representatives' Select Counittee on Assassinations. The purpose of this letter is merely to advise the Bureau that, prior to the assassination, certain information was not known to Special Agent Hosty. In particular, he had not been advised of the visit of Lee Harvey Oswald to Mexico City and was not aware of the people to whom Oswald spoke while in Mexico City. Nor did he know the real identity of those people.

Whether such information was available to other persons in the Bureau is not personally known to Special Agent Nosty although he expects that it was. Nowever, it was not through the fault of any individual in the employ of the Bureau that this information was not made available to Special Agent Hosty. Regulations concerning the handling of classified information in effect on November 22, 1963, and still in effect, left to the discretion of the person receiving such information whether to transmit this information to Special Agent Hosty.

Moreover, under the Bureau's criteria for conducting an interview of a person in Oswald's status in October-November, 1963, it is doubtful whether Bureau regulations would have allowed Mr. Mosty to interview Oswald even had additional information concerning Oswald's visit to Mexico City been made available to him.

We hope this helps to clarify this matter and we appreciate your attention.

ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT JOHN P. KENNEDY NOVEMBER 22, 1963

PURPOSE: To provide facts pertinent to matters raised by Francis I. Lilly, Attorney for Special Agent James P. Hosty, Jr., and to recommend acknowledgement of Lilly's letter to the Director. (U)

STNOPSIS: In a letter to the Director, SA Hosty's Attorney advises that Hosty, prior to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, was not aware of Oswald's visit to Mexico City nor of the persons Oswald saw there, that classified information pertaining to this visit was withheld from Hosty and that Bureau regulations would have precluded Hosty's interview of Oswald prior to President Kennedy's assassination. Details set forth rebut, in whole or in part, these contentions of Lilly. (U)

RECOMMENDATION: That attached letter be sent to Attorney [111]. (U)

DETAILS: Francis I. Lilly, personal Attorney for SA James P. Hosty, Jr., Kansas City Division, by letter to the Director, with eopy to SA Drew J. Clark, of September 19, 1978, attached, advised in part as follows: (U)

"...prior to the assassination, certain information was not known to Special Agent Hosty. In particular, he had not been advised of the visit of Lee Harvey Oswald to Nerico City and was not aware of the people to whom Oswald spoke while in Merico City. Nor did he know the real identity of those people." (U)

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ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT SERVER

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Referring to classified information pertaining to Oswald's Mexico City visit, Lilly contends:

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"...this information was not made available to SA Hosty." and "...it is doubtful whether Bureau regulations would have allowed Mr. Hosty to interview Oswald even had additional information been made available to him." (U)

Information being furnished has been gleaned from a review of the original Bureau file (105-82555) and original Dallas file (100-10461) on Lee Harvey Oswald and from the December 3, 1975, Bureau letter to the Attorney General septioned "Assassination of President John F. Kennedy" which set forth the results of an FBI inquiry into Hosty's knowledge of the Lee Harvey Oswald visit to Mexico City prior to President Kennedy's assassination. (U)



Were block stamped into the Dallas Office en October 25, 1963, were routinely channeled to Hosty by the Desk on October 28, 1963, and were not retrieved from Hosty's personal workbox until after the assassination on November 22, 1963, according to a notation on Dallas serial 100-10461-50 by Dallas Supervisor Kenneth C. Howe, to wit: (X)

"48-49-50 e/o (or 'go') to JPH 10-28-63. Obtained from his box and initialed into file to complete file following 11-22-63 H" (U)

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In short, absent special mitigating circumstances, it is unusual for any Agent to claim ignorance of the contents of three communications residing in his personal workbox for approximately twenty-six days. Dallas file 100-10461-48, -49, -50 and Bureau file 105-82555-42 and -43. Bureau file serial 43 corresponds to Dallas serial 48 and is classified "SECRET". (U)

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ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENHEDY

This communication was rowtinely channeled to Hosty as indicated by Hosty's mane appearing in the appropriate place in the block stamp. Hosty's mane was then crossed out and the serial was initialed to file by Superviser Howe. It appears that this communication, while originally directed to Hosty, was retrieved from channels by Supervisor Howe after the assassination on Howenber 22, 1963, whereupon he crossed out Hosty's make in the block stamp, as was done on Dallas serials 48, 49 and 50, and initialed them to file in order that a complete file on Oswald might be assassination on Howenber 22, 1963, but there is certainly no data to suggest he was ever denied classified information pertiment to his case on Oswald prior to the assassination. Classified information was contaised in the Oswald file and Hosty was free to review same. (U)


Past research in the Lee Harvey Oswald file diseloses no justification for a statement that Bureau regulations would have presluded interview of Oswald prior to the assassination of President Kennedy in October or November, 1963. A December 10, 1963, memorandum from J. H. Gale to Mr. Tolsen referring to the Oswald investigation, states in part, "His wife should have been interviewed before the assassination and investigation intensified-not held in abeyance S VALLE Pererense to investigation intensified does not specifically state that Gawald should have been interviewed, there is no justi-fication for assuming that an intensified investigation would have excluded an interview of Oswald. An Agent with Eosty's experience (EOD January 21, 1952,) would be expected to conduct the interview of a security subject without compromising elassified information. Also, Cavald had been interviewed previously by Bureau Agents on June 26, 1962, August 16, 1962, and August 10, 1963. (U)

It is felt that Attorney Lilly's letter should be acknowledged without detail as any specific rebuttal involves reference to information and communications which are still classified. (U)

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
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

The above-captioned individual was arrested on Vuly 23 1959, by the Cuban Revolutionary Police. His twelve-year-old a son, KDWARD, was detained at the same time. Police accused him of having entered Cuba in a private plane without permission.

The following information was received-from HUGH D. KESSLER, Nelfare Officer, U. S. Embassy, Havana, Cuba

MARTINO actually entered Cuba, according to Fan American Mirways records, via Pan American Flight from Miami, Florida, at 5:45(P.N. on July 23, 1959. He was accompanied by his son, EDWARD. = MARTINO stated he went to a private home to deliver a personal messige to a friend and there met a woman named BOFIA. He was later arrested at his hotel. The woman "SOFIA" was identified as Mrs. SOFIA VENTURA, wife of the notorious Batista C.1. police officer, Major ESTEBAN VENTURA PRO, who was one of the police accused of various heinous crimes during the Batista regime.

Mr. KESSLER stated he was furnished the following information by a Dr. <u>ESTEVEZ</u> of Havana, <u>Cuba</u>, Dr. ESTEVEZ first met MARTINO moout ten months ago when MARTINO was staying at the Hotel Deauville, Havana, where Dr. ESTEVEZ is the hotel physician. At that time he treated MARTINO for a kidney ailment. After treating him, Dr. ESTEVEZ became friendly with MARTINO and may him quite frequently. MARTINO has made twelve to fourteen visits to Cuba since January 1, 1959. According to Dr. ESTEVEZ, MARTINO was a close friend of many former members of the Batista government, such as ESTEBAN VENTURA, ROLANDO MASFERRER (ex-Cuban Senator and political gangster), IRENALDO GARCIA BAEZ (ex-Head of Cuban Army Intelligence), and of many American gamblers such as SANTOS TRAFFICANTE, Top Hoodlum from Tampa, Florida.

According to Dr. ESTEVEZ, MARTINO originally came to Cuba to establish a branch of his Radio-Page Corporation as he was in trouble in the United States regarding income tax matters

MARTINO was also engaged in a suuggling venture with MASPERRE involving the movement of autos and eggs through the Cuban Portof Mariel, about 20 miles from Havana.

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MARTINO approached Dr. ESTEVEZ regarding being the house physician for a house of prostitution which MARTINO planned to open near the Deauville Hotel. MARTINO's close friend and business associate in the United States was dire ALLEN/ROTH.

Dr. ESTEVEZ volunteered the information that including his two brothers, were strong supporters of Prime Minist FIDEL CASTRO RUZ and that his two brothers are presently in the Revolutionary Army. Dr. ESTEVEZ added that his conversations with police officials led him to believe that MARTINO was being held only to obtain information and that he would be released if he desired to tell Government officials concerning his contacts. MARTINO is presently confined to the Chief of Police : Headquarters in Havana.

Bureau will be kept advised on this matter.


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
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

The July 26th Novement is a revolutionary organization founded and led by FIDEL CASTRO, the present Prime Minister of Cuba. It was dissolved during late 1962 when it was absorbed into the Integrated Revolutionary Organization in Cuba, along with the Communist Party of Cuba, and the other principal political parties.

On December 7, 1967, Mr. HENRY TAYLOR, Office of the Coordinator of Cuban Affairs, United States Department of State (USDS), advised the IACB had alleged fifteen million dollars was available for use in obtaining the release of Cuban political prisoners, Reportedly, GERALDINE SHAMMA had been in contact with the Czechoslovakian Embassy in Washington and allegedly obtained permission from the Cuban Government to enter and leave Cuba. Mr. TAYLOR stated SHAMMA had not been in contact with his office since their first meeting several months previously.

On December 8, 1967, SHAMMA declared to "Replica" that she would go to Cuba to negotiate the freedom of Cuban political prisoners. According to an article which appeared in this publication on December 4, 1967, SHAMMA was quoted as saying she "was prepared for any eventuality." It stated she had maintained close contact with the Czechoslovakian Embassy in Washington, D. C., through her attorney, BENJAMIN ALTER. This article reflected the IACB had ten million dollars available and hoped to obtain another five million to liberate approximately fifteen hundred people. SHAMMA stated they did not plan to attempt to seek the release of any prisoners who had accepted CASTRO's rehabilitation plan.

The article indicated the IACB received economic aid from various Latin-American nations, including Costa Rica, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Panama, El Salvador, Dominican Republic, and Canada. Also, it stated the relatives of the political prisoners are not being requested to contribute any funds, and she specified the United States Government was not involved. 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
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
