Oswald's Mother To Resume Talk

WASHINGTON BUREAU Commission members are most innocent of the assassing and a dubious of Mrs. Marguerite Oswald's attempt "to product evidence" of her son's innocence of the assassination of President Kennecy, The Times Herald learned Tuesday.

Chief Justice Earl Warren, who heads the presidential commission, has announced that Mrs. Oswald's testimony shows "nothing new that would change the picture as I see it."

The chief justice even added that the commission has learned Mrs. Oswald had no contact with her son, Lee Harvey Oswald, for "around a year" prior to the Nov. 22 assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

The stout, grey-haired mother flew into Washington Sunday night proclaiming she would produce evidence for the commission to prove her son's innocence.

She tried to speak to the press Monday after testifying before the commission but demurred after her lawyer, John Doyle of Washington, recommended against any statements.

Mrs. Oswald has told the commission about her son's life from his Russian stay until his death, Chief Justice Warren said.

FIRST DEFENSE WITNESS

EE HARVEY OSWALD, the man accused of assassinating President Kennedy, was defended Feb. 10 for the first time before the Presidential commission investigating the murder. His mother, Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, appeared before the seven-member panel in an effort to prove her son was innocent.

Chief Justice Earl Warren, commission head, said after the first day that Mrs. Oswald's testimony was "helpful," but that it contained "nothing that would change the picture as I see it." The picture, presumably, is that drawn by the FBI in a still-secret report, though portions have been leaked to the press, axeging that Oswald was the "lone and unaided gunman" who assassinated the President.

Mrs. Oswald, appearing with a courtappointed lawyer, spent the first day discussing her son's history and their personal relationship. She promised to return with information that would contradict the official belief that Oswald was guilty.

LANE PRESENT: On Feb. 11 Mrs. Oswald again presented evidence after discussing it with the commission counsel and attorney Mark Lane. Lane had flown to Washington from San Francisco, where he had been on a speaking tour under auspices of the GUARDIAN and other

groups.

not appear officially before the commission, but submitted in writing two questions which she answered.

One concerned the nature of her confinement at a motel in Texas. At one point, she said, she sought to leave the notel and was escorted back to her room, with a Secret Service man holding her by each arm.

THE GUN: The second question con-

cerned her discussion with Marina about Marina's questioning by the Dallas police Nov. 22 soon after Lee Oswald's arrest. She said Marina told her she was asked whether her husband had a gun. She answered in the affirmative. Then, when shown the alleged murder weapon, she was asked whether this was her husband's gun. Marina said, according to Mrs. Oswald: "I do not think that that is Lee's gun."

After his quick trip to Washington, Lane flew to Los Angeles for a meeting. He had spoken to 900 persons at a Ssn Francisco meeting sponsored by the GUARDIAN Feb. 8 and to 1,000 students at an assembly at the University of California at Berkeley Feb. 10. Mrs. Oswald's four-day testimony confirmed earlier reports leaked to the press by the Secret Service: "She stated that while she did not like to believe her husband killed President Kennedy, the facts presented to her since the assassination would not permit her to reach any other conclusion," Warren said Feb. 6. The widow was first said to be convinced of her husband's guilt on Jan. 7, six weeks during which she was held incommunicado by federal agents.

LINK TO CIA? It is not known, of course, exactly what aspects of "national security" are involved in the Oswald case, though it is being increasingly speculated in responsible circles that Oswald was being trained as an undercover operative for the FBI or Central Intelligence Agency. If this were true and made public, it would generate widespread national distrust of America's "security" apparatus.

The trial of Jack Ruby, the nightclub operator who killed Oswald in Dallas two days after Kennedy was shot, is scheduled for Feb. 17. He will plead insanity. Defense lawyer Melvin Belli began calling witnesses Feb. 11 in a pretrial hearing in an effort to prove that Ruby would not receive a fair trial in Dallas.

In the last of a series of syndicated rticles by Ruby, written with the as-estance of reporter William Read Woodfield, the admitted executioner concluded: "Oswald was a dead man before I shot him." Ruby said he murdered Oswald after Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade stated that Oswald was guilty of killing Kennedy, indicating that he would not have done so had Wade not made his accusation.

20 hours of questioning before the commission. She was accompanied by her lawyer and the Secret Service agents who have been her constant companions since Oswald was arrested a few hours after Kennedy was shot in Dallas Nov. 22.

The commission is charged with evaluating evidence submitted by the FBI and other police agencies indicating that the 24-year-old ex-Marine was the "lone and unaided assassin" of President Kennedy, and allegedly fired three shots at the Presidential motorcade from the sixth floor of the Texas Book Depository where he was employed. Following its investigation, which probably will last several more months, the seven-member panel is to "report its findings and conclusions" to the public. Warren's statement after the second day of Marina Oswald's testimony, however, indicates that certain of the commission's findings may be withheld if they concern matters of national security. Asked by reporters when the testimony would be made public, Warren said:

"Yes, there will come a time (when it is released). But it might not be in your lifetime. I am not referring to anything especially, but there may be some things that would involve security. This would be preserved but not made public."

Curious Are Drawn-To Hear Mrs. Oswald

Hours before Mrs. Marguerite Oswald was due to appear at Town Hall last night to defend her son, the crowd began to gather—the curious, the credulous, the hostile, the ones with angles of their own.

Most of them, including the sprinkling of women who wore mink and the men clothed in cashmere, merely wanted to hear what the mother of the man accused of slaying a President had to say.

"I guess like most people here I'm just curious," said playwright Lillian Hellman.

"I'm dying of curiosity, I just want to see what she looks like," said Mrs. A. I Liebling, widow of the writer.

"I'm more curious about this Mrs. Oswald than any other aspect of the case," said a man who would identify himself only as an International Business Machines executive.

Ticket Moochers, Too

As police formed the crowd into a line outside the hall on W. 43rd St., the ticket moochers who somehow can smell a sellout appeared. "Got an extra ticket?" they said softly as they moved up and down the line. They had little luck.

At the boxoffice, a girl said the appearance of Lee Oswald's mother and her lawyer, Mark Lane, had sold out the hall's 1500 seats by 6:30 p.m. and hundreds of would be buyers had been turned away.

Walking back and forth in front of the hall were those who had a special axe to grind.

Some causes were easily identified — friends of the National Guardian, the left wing weekly that sponsored Mrs. Oswald's appearance, were pushing that publication.

Others were distributing literature that demanded justice in the Rosenberg-Sobell case, or asked for the reinstatement of five expelled supporters of the Socialist Workers party.

The crowd, orderly and even a little subdued outside the hall, brightened only slightly when they took their seats and Mrs. Oswald and Lane appeared on stage.



LANE GIVES VIEWS TO WARREN PANEL

Public Hearing Is Held at Request of Lawyer

WASHINGTON, March 4 (UPI)—The Presidential commission investigating the assassination of President Kennedy held its first public hearing today at the request of a New York Laurer.

The request was made by Mark Lane, a former New York Assemblyman who claims to represent the President's accused assassin, Lee Harvey Oswald.

Chief Justice Earl Warren, who heads the commission, opened the session at the commission's headquarters building by saying that Mr. Lane's request for the hearing was thoroughly agreeable to the commission

"The commission does not operate in a secret way," Mr. War-reh said.

He asserted that the hearings had been limited to the "quiet of our rooms" because it was felt that this would speed the hearings and avoid inconven-

"The purpose of this commission," Mr. Warren said, "is to make known to the President and the American public all of the testimony we have received. All of it will be made available at an appropriate time."

Mr. Lane, who has frequently challenged the view that Oswald was guilt; of shooting Mr. Kennedy, told the commission he had heard of a secret meeting in a Dallas night club cig. days before the President was killed.

Present at the meeting, he said, were J. D. Tippitt, the Dallas patrolman who was slain while trying to arrest Oswald; Bernard Weissman, a Mount Vernon, N. Y., resident who had placed an anti-Kennedy advertisement in a Dallas newspaper the day the President was shot, and an unidentified third person.

Oswald's Mother Calls Ruby Fate of Harmful to Son

DALLAS, Tex., Mar. 14 (AP).

—Mrs. Marguerite Oswald said today she wished the jury had sentenced Jack Ruby to life imprisonment rather than to death in the electric chair.

"I want him alive," she said of the man who killed her son. "I want him alive because I believe Jack Ruby was a paid killer who deprived my son of his trial. I am confident I can prove there are things to be brought out.

"I also do not believe in capital punishment. I would have preferred him to get life imprisonment without parole."

Mrs. Oswald talked calmly to reporters while she drank iced tea in a nearby shop.

"I cannot say I was surprised at the verdict. I think the jury did what it thought best.

"I intend to continue speaking in my son's cause," Mrs. Oswald said. "There is much more to work with now that the Ruby trial is finished."

Her next speaking engagement, she said, will be on a television panel program in Chicago on March 25.

MOTHER OF OSWALD ENDS TIE WITH LANE

Mrs. Marguerite C. Oswald said here yesterday that she had dismissed Mark Lane, her New York lawyer.

York lawyer.

Mr. Lane had sought, before the Warren Commission, to clear her late son, Lee H. Oswald, of the charge of assassinating President Kennedy. Oswald was killed by Jack Ruby in Dallas Nov. 24, a few days after the assassination.

At the Beekman Tower Hotel, Mrs. Oswald said she had asked Mr. Lane to send her a

At the Beekman Tower Hotel, Mrs. Oswald said she had asked Mr. Lane to send her a copy of his report to the commission and to stop any "organized campaign" on behalf of her son through his "Citizens Committee of Inquiry."

She received no contributions from an appeal she made in Chicago March 21, to pay for an office, investigator and a stenographer, she said, because people mistakenly believed she was affiliated with that committee.

Last Jan. 11 Mr. Lane agreed to represent her, free of charge, in collecting information on the shooting of the President and her son and presenting it to the commission.

"I consider your work finished, and hereby terminate your representation," Mrs. Oswald told him in a letter to committee headquarters, 156-Fifth Avenue, She praised his work.


