These are a few FBI records I laid aside for when I had time to write you about them. There may have been more but I don't see them now and may have filed the copies.

That Jerry Ford was DeLoach's informer inside the Warren Commission is not new. That he did this to FBI-CIA relations is new, so far as I know. Couldn't have been helpful to national security, without quotes.

The first of the "charges" relates to a cock-and-bull story any smart kid should have recognized as a fake ^{but} the CIA in Mexico, I think then under Phillips and I know with Ambassador Mann going for it, it made quite a stir. As late as the Church/Schweiker subcommittee days the spooks still were conning others into believe the name of the faker, Gilberto Alvarado Ugarte, had to be kept secret. They coded him "D" as I recall.

The idea behind this makes it relevant to the column's past. It was to promote the "kick-back" theory, the Cubans killed JFK in retaliation. Nonsense in any form.

I don't know which column item is referred to in the next one.

My interpretation of the last graf is that the FBI knew the CIA would attribute the FBI's info to the Warren Commission and would thereby chill any CIA desire to help the Commission.

The 2/24/64 record refers to a broadcast of which I have no knowledge.

The three stapled together as the third I'm sure refer to the leak to the column of what it went for and Jack still goes for, that there was some kind of connection between the Giancana-Roselli plots for the CIA and the JFK assassination. It is impossible but it was made to look good and Jack is still strong for it as of the last I read.

It was timed for Garrison's benefit.

In retrospect doesn't it appear a bit unusual that counsel for such a pair would let such a story out? Ordinarily that is asking for an undertaker and to risk the wrath of the Bar.

Makes no difference to me but I'm sure Jack was used, as the current batch has used him and had him puff the impossible to make them look good.

SUBJECT: RELATIONS WITH CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY (CIA)

Information developed by Mr. DeLoach has indicated that John McCone, Director, CIA, has attacked the Bureau in a vicious and underhanded manner characterized with sheer dishonesty. If the facts are true, we can safely assume that McCone will continue such tactics to the point of seriously jeopardizing Bureau prestige and reputation. We can sit by and take no action or bring this matter to a head. Over the years, we have had numerous conflicts with all CIA Directors. Many of these problems have arisen from statements attributed to these men. Experience in dealing with CIA has shown that a firm and forthright confrontation of these officials has protected Bureau interests in a most effective manner. If McCone is involved in such nefarious activity, there is a way of putting a stop to this.

The charges against McCone can be described as follows:

(1) He allegedly informed Congressman Jerry Ford that CIA had uncovered a plot in Mexico City indicating that Lee Harvey Oswald had received \$6,500 to assassinate President Kennedy.

(2) McCone allegedly made this same statement to Drew Pearson.

(3) In both instances, the statements were false and McCone should have known that they were false since his agency was fully informed that the story concerning the receipt of money in Mexico was completely discredited.

ACTION:

If approved, the Liaison Agent will confront McCone with the allegations. Congressman Ford will not be identified but will be referred to as a high-ranking Government-official. Bureau

names will not be identified. McCone will be told that information received by the Bureau indicates that he has made false statements and it will be pointed out to him that his own agency was previously informed that the story regarding Oswald's receipt of money in Mexico City was completely discredited. He will further be told that we can only characterize his actions as a vicious and unwarranted attack against the Bureau.

If McCone did make the referred statements, we can expect him to make a denial. However, it is believed that we will have made our point and he certainly will know where he stands, will undoubtedly have a profound respect for our capabilities to be informed, and he certainly will bear all of this in mind in the event he gets any ideas of making similar statements in the future.

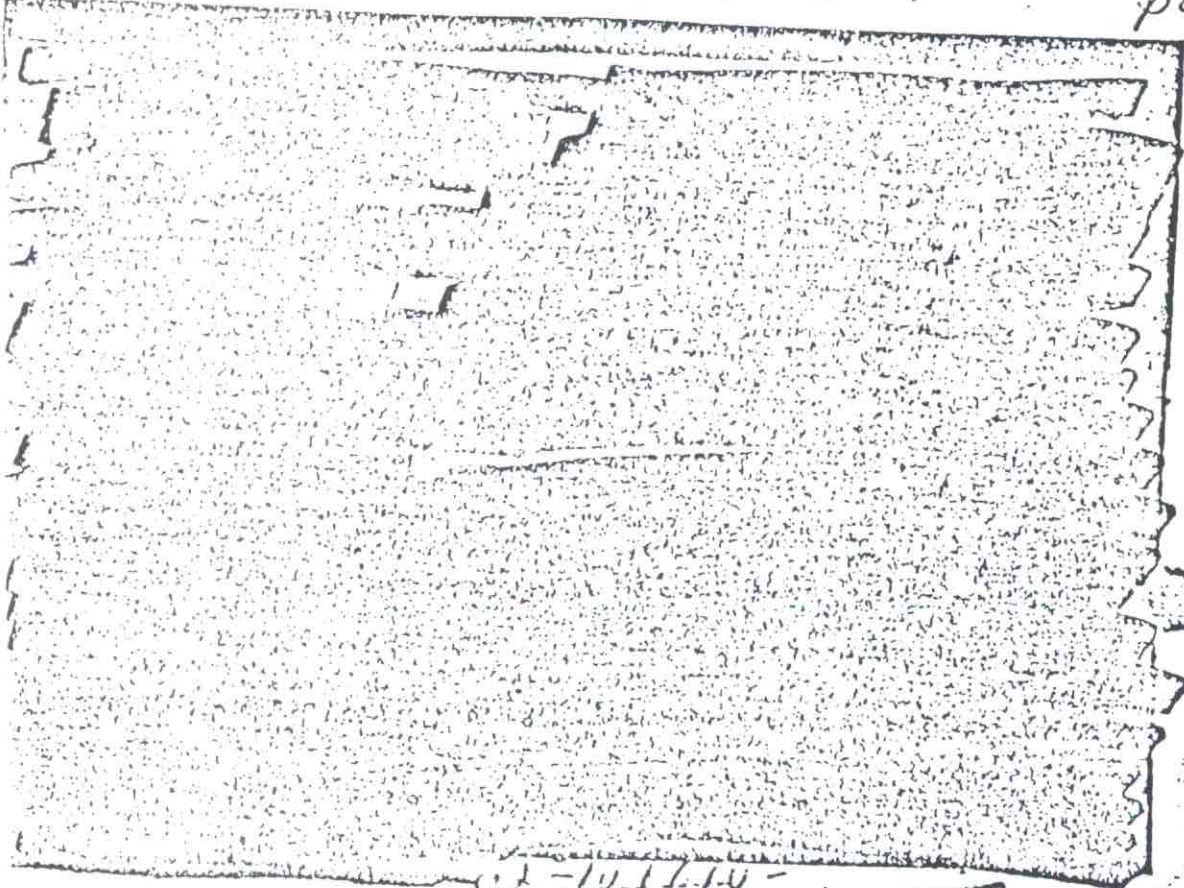

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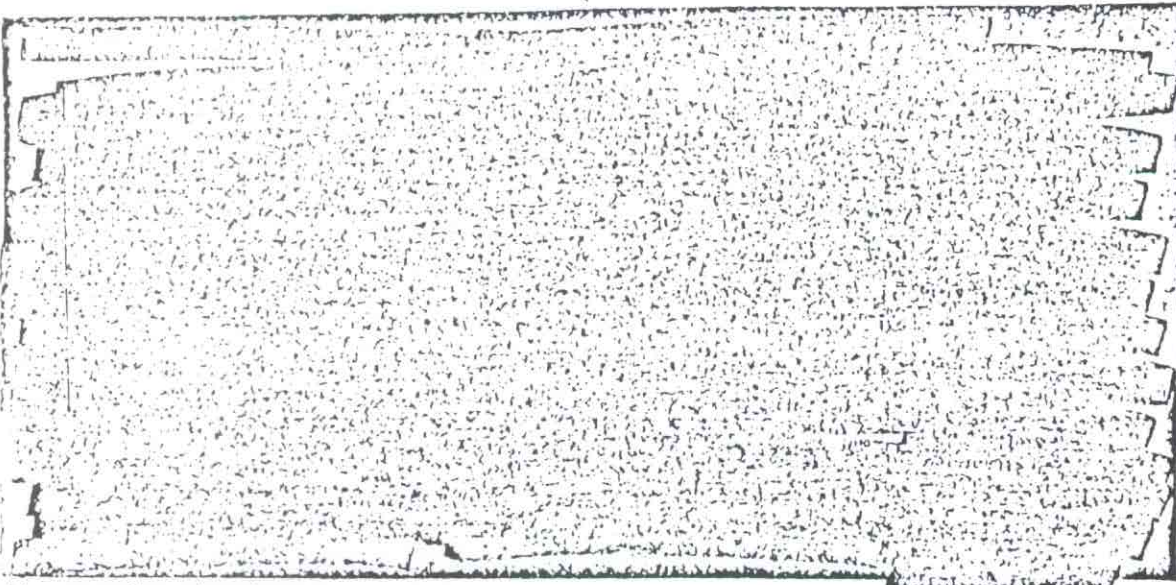
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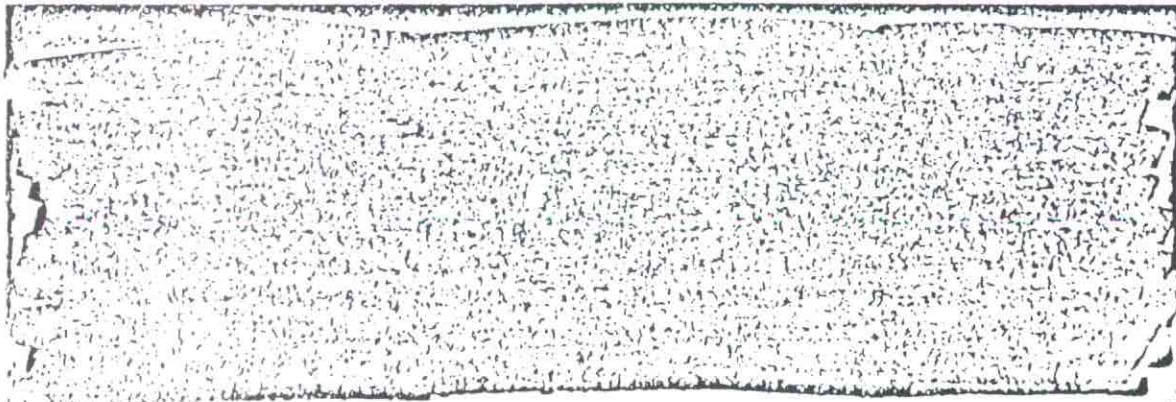

Dear Mr. Rowley:

Thank you for your letter dated February 13, 1967, and for me of your discussion with Chief Justice Earl Warren on January 31, 1967, and the information he furnished to you.

In connection with the allegation that a Castro espionage was involved in the assassination of President Kennedy, our investigation uncovered no evidence implicating Fidel Castro or officials of the Cuban Government were involved with Lee Harvey Oswald in the assassination of President Kennedy.

This Bureau is not conducting any investigation regarding this matter. However, should Mr. Pearson, Mr. Morgan, or Mr. Morgan's source of information care to volunteer any information to this Bureau, it would be accepted. Thereafter, consideration would be given as to whether any additional investigation is warranted.

I am taking the liberty of furnishing a copy of your letter and my reply to you to the Acting Attorney General.
