Lady, by Thomas Tryon (Fawcett Crest, \$1.35). This bestseller lacks the spooky atmosphere of Harvest Home but does have mystery, nostalgia and a striking profile of a woman living with a traumatic memory.

"They've Killed the President": The Search for the Murderers of John F. Kennedy, by Robert Sam Anson (Bantam, \$2.50). In the 12 years since the assassination of John Kennedy, many books have been written to challenge the findings of the Warren Commission. This one sums up the most significant findings of earlier studies and adds its own evidence and arguments, not only on the physical details of what happened during a few crucial seconds in Dallas but on a variety of individuals and organizations which could have been involved in a killing that, Anson insists, could not have been the work of a single, deranged gumman. Even more impressive than the new material brought into evidence (photos as well as facts) is the careful sifting and logical examination of data previously available. Anson's basic thesis is that a new investigation is needed, and he documents that point impressively. Those who have been skeptical about the accepted version of this event will find here, clearly expressed, the rational basis for the nagging doubts that have disturbed them. It is the best, most thorough and most convincing statement so far for the "dissenting" opinion that is now held by a majority of Americans.

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
