

Hate, Racism Fading, Says Jewish Leader

The foundations under the pillars of hate, discrimination, prejudice and racism are being undermined, "although much too slowly," a Jewish leader said here today.

"However, our people are a patient race," asserted Frank Feinberg of Jersey City, N.J., president of the Temple Beth-El Brotherhood, in an address to the 22nd Biennial Convention of the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods and the Jewish Chautauqua Society at the Roosevelt Hotel.

A MEMBER of panel on the problems of Chautauqua, educational adjunct of the federation, Feinberg then quoted "The Legacy of the Prophets": "There may be much suffering because of spiritual blindness, great travail because of human stupidity and deep searching before mankind discovers its soul, but in the end of days, it shall come to pass."

This, he said, is the hope and concept of the Jewish Chautauqua Society.

Others on the panel included Solon Myles Chadabe, New York, federation vice president; Ivan Novick, Pittsburgh, Pa.,

and Sylvan S. Lebow, New York City, executive director.

ALL EFFORTS of the Jewish Chautauqua Society, said Feinberg, "are directed toward a single purpose, to bring to the students on the college campus, the Boy Scouts, students in secondary schools and the youth attending Christian summer camps the experience of significant learning in history, religion, culture, ethics and contemporary issues related to our people."

He quoted one Christian student as saying, "I think of my Jewish brother and I thank God we can dialogue together. I do not want to change him. I only want to learn. Secretly, I think I need to love him . . . I must love my brother if I want to love God."

Feinberg said that if these are honest sentiments, "our work has not been in vain."

J. R. ARKUSH, Los Angeles, Calif., attorney, presented loving cup awards to Chautauqua Society units. The awards were donated by Harold W. Dubinsky, St. Louis, Mo., honorary president.

William Lucas Jr., New Orleans attorney, today was elected a member of the 70-member board. Officers were to be elected later in the day.

The convention ends tomorrow night with a banquet at which Sol M. Linowitz, U.S. ambassador to the Organization of American States, will be the featured speaker.
