



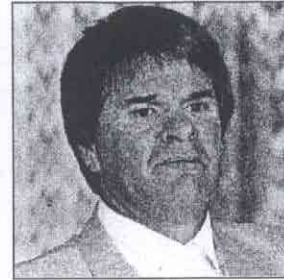

Where Were They When . . . ?

MANY PEOPLE CALL THE MOMENT they learned of John Kennedy's assassination their most vivid memory. Larry King asked some famous Americans where they were on Nov. 22, 1963, for a TNT special airing later this month. Some replies:

Bill Clinton: "I was a senior in high school in Hot Springs, Ark. I was in fourth period, advanced math. [The teacher] was called to the phone . . . He came back totally ashen-faced. I'll

never forget it in my life. I never saw such a desolate look on a man's face. [He] said that the president had been shot and probably killed . . . I put my head down on the desk and said a little prayer."

Barbra Streisand: Heard the news on the radio in a jeweler's while buying "my first piece of important jewelry, a beautiful, beautiful antique choker . . . I never wear it."

Sean Connery: Was practicing at an L.A. golf range: "Suddenly [the golfers] stopped and there were a lot of people standing around crying."

Richard Nixon: Flew out of Dallas that morning after attending a convention for Pepsi-Cola, clients of his law firm.

Chubby Checker: Heard it in L.A. while backstage for a Jerry Lewis show he felt would seal his career: "The world stopped . . . like a hush over the world and a hush over my career."

Pete Rose: Was at the Fort Knox army base. "That was after my first year of being a baseball pro. I did my basic training during the winter."
