# Peace Corps recruits remember Kennedy

"Dear President Kennedy, "I look longingly to the year - more than a quarter of a century ago - when you appealed to our better instincts and elicited idealism instead of cynicism and opportunism. When you uttered the much-quoted 'Ask not what your country can do for you; ask what you can do for your country,' you were wise enough to provide us with some answers. #### Freed 'from race having a place in my life' "Mr. President:

"Newspapers in the Dominican Republic carried front page photographs of black demonstrators being assaulted with dogs and water hoses. The spectacle in Birmingham (Ala.) was damaging our country's reputation. In this atmo-sphere, Marco's brother asked a very chilling question: 'If I go to your country, will they throw stones at me?' I was now seeing my country as others saw us.

"My Peace Corps experience began emancipating me from race having a place in my life. For over twenty years, as a lawyer, citizen, churchman, and now judge. I have worked for racial and economic justice and opportunity."



## Nov. 22: I 'lost part of' myself

Entry dated Nov. 22, 1963: "Ron Kraus came through the door saying, 'President Kennedy is dead.' Our shouts of denial did nothing to make the moment seem any more real. "I laid awake feeling sick,

listened to the hyenas hollering . . . and the crying of sick children. The sounds of the world seemed to continue, but I felt that I not only had lost a rudder that gave us direction, but lost a part of (myself).'
