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
WASHINGTON—Intrigued by Oliver Stone's controversial movie "JFK," Randolph H. Robertson went looking recently for physical evidence to support Stone's view that the assassination of President John F. Kennedy was the result of a conspiracy. He believes he found it.


A radiologist from Nashville, Robertson studied post-mortem X-rays of Kennedy's head and convinced himself that he found a second bullet wound in Kennedy's skull that had gone unnoticed before.


To most atudents of the assassipation, Robertson's finding is highly implausible. But to Robertson, it is persuasive evidence that shots came from more than one direction, meaning that Lee Harvey Dawald did not act alsons.
