here were 122 attacks or the attened attacks on for-el diplomats and their famores in the past nine months—compared with 112 in the preceeding 12-month pe fod, the department said, an increase of more than 40 percent.

crimes against diplomats and their families are local offenses, meaning that de-tection and punishment of the criminals are a local matter, with standards varying from state to state.

The Nixon Administration proposed last August that crimes against foreign offi-cials, embassies and other properties of foreign govern-ments be made federal offenses, but Congress has not held hearings on the proposal.

State Department spokesman Charles Gray, report-ing the latest increase in violence and threats of violence against foreign offi-cials, said that without doubt the most serious ineident in recent months was gunfire through the window of a Soviet building in New York. Children inside narrowly escaped injury.
