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Dear Steve, Linglo
Enclosed are a State of 'haryland map I've marked up for you and a xerox of a Frederick map to show you how to get here. I've not made a copy of the State map on the chance it may at some ppint be of use to you in the future.

The downtown beginning is under the number 17 to 18 , marked with a blue arrowi and a red smear. You do take Franklin Street West and that does put you on Edmondson Ave., which you take to Cook's Lane. I've marked that in blue that does not dhow verry well. I've marked the xerox of part of the Freflerick map in red, beginning whe the red smear where US4OW first shows on it. "To where you leave that road, it is also US15N. At West Patrick St. US 40 W leaves 15 and you leave it with 40 to the motel, where you turn right onto Baughman's Lane. If by any chance you make a mistake and do not take that cloverleaf, you can get here almost as easily from the noxt one, which is marked as I recall Fort Detrick and Hood College. 蛙t street, where there is a half cloverleaf, is Rosemont Ave. I've marked that in blue. Shookstown Road begins at Rosemont.

On the reverse side of the xerox I've a sketch of where you leave Cook's Lane, just after you've gone under a bridge. It is the first cross-street and the first light after you go under that bridge that you turn left for a short distance to take the entrance to 170 . I think that after you make that left turn it is the second road that you take. They are near each other, both on your right, and only a very short distance on that road the name of which I do not remember. At the point where you turn left to get to the entrance to $I 70$ there is on pverhead sign referring to a street $I_{n g l e s i d e . ~}^{\text {is }}$.

After you and 40 leave 15 and just before you get to that $H_{o l i d a y} I_{n n}$ stay to the right, especially after the road widens a bit there so that you are in the correct lane for your right turn, which you can make on a red light if traffic permits.

On our trips back from J̦ohns Hopkins it takes about an hour and a quarter.
I do not know exactly where your hotel is but it should take no longer from anywhere in that area.
