X-Rays Subpena to Be Changed

The district attorney's office has taken steps to amend a subpoena requiring the United States archivist in Washington, D. C., to produce photos and X-rays of the body of President John F. Kennedy.

Assistant District Attorney James L. Alcock said the change was necessary because the man to whom it had been directed, Dr. Robert H. Bahmer, no longer is archivist.

Alcock said that in accordance with instructions of the U.S. marshal's office, he approved amending the subpoena to require the current archivist, Dr. James B. Rhoads, to produce the material in Garrison's office next Friday.

The subpoena contended that the information is needed to prepare and present the state's case against Clay L. Shaw, who is charged with conspiring to murder Kennedy.

The district attorney's office claimed to have information that indicated Kennedy was struck by bullets fired from three different directions.

President Lyndon B. Johnson has ordered that all of the ma-

terial remain sealed in the national archives in Washington until the year 2039 at the request of the Kennedy family.
