Inspection of Materials Relating to the Autopsy of President John F. Kennedy The National Archives October 31, 1966

At approximately 2:05 p.m., October 31, 1966, in Room 6W-3 of the National Archives Building, Mr. Burke Marshall, the representative of the executors of the estate of President John F. Kennedy, delivered to the custody of the Government of the United States certain materials pertaining to the autopsy of the late President. This action was pursuant to a letter from Mr. Marshall to Honorable Lawson B. Knott, Jr., Administrator of General -Services, dated October 29, 1966, which constituted a deed of gift of these and other materials from the estate of John F. Kennedy to the Government of the United States.

The materials were in a footlocker that had previously been delivered to the National Archives by representatives of Senator Robert F. Kennedy for purposes of secure storage. At the time of its delivery the footlocker was locked, its key was retained by representatives of Senator Robert F. Kennedy, and its contents were not divulged to officials of the National

Archives and Records Service.

Assistant Attorney General; Harold F: Reis, Executive Assistant to the Attorney General; Robert H. Bahmer, Archivist of the United States; James B; Rhoads, Deputy Archivist of the United States; Herman Kahn, Assistant to the General Counsel, General Services Administration. Immediately after the opening of the footlocker Miss Novello and Messrs. Marshall and Wozencraft departed and those remaining inspected its contents.

Included in the material in the footlocker was a carbon copy of a letter from Senator Robert F. Kennedy to Vice Admiral George G. Burkley dated April 22, 1965, authorizing the release to the Senator's custody all the material relating to the autopsy of President Kennedy of which Admiral Burkley had personal knowledge and delivery of the same to Mrs. Evelyn Lincoln in the National Archives Building (a copy of this letter is attached hereto as Exhibit A). The footlocker also contained the original of a letter from Admiral Burkley to Mrs. Lincoln, dated April 26, 1965, transmitting materials relating to the autopsy of Rresident Kennedy. These materials were itemized in a list attached to the letter. (This letter and its attachment are appended hereto as Exhibit B.)

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Inspection of the footlocker disclosed that it contained items 1 through 8, Admiral inclusive, referred to in the attachment to/Burkley's letter of April 26, 1965. It did not contain any of the material referred to in item 9 of that attachment. However, the footlocker did contain three large manila envelopes of material which appeared to be copies of military service records of the late President and which had no apparent relationship to the autopsy

Messrs. Bahmer, Reis, Rhoads, Kahn and Brewster examined the material enumerated in items 2 through 8, inclusive, of the attachment to Admiral Burkley's letter and concluded as a result of this examination that the

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material referred to under those items was present. That material was removed from the footlocker and placed in a security cabinet previously approved by Mr. Marshall.
