Ban of Panther Newspaper Sought

BALTIMORE (AP) — Atty. Gen. Francis B. Burch of Maryland has asked the Justice Department to explore feasibility of banning distribution of the Black Panther national newspaper.

Burch said the paper exerts "persons to do bodily harm or to kill police officers or other members of the community." He cited the fatal shooting of a Baltimore po-

liceman and critical wounding of another two weeks ago.

In a letter Tuesday to John N. Mitchell, the U.S. attorney general, Burch asked him Tuesday "whether through the postal laws or otherwise if we can prevent publications such as the Black Panther newspaper from being sent through the mails or being distributed in commerce."

Burch said the newspaper,

printed in San Francisco, recently published methods for ambushing and assassinating police.

"There is a remarkable similarity between the methods of ambush of the two policemen here and the recommended procedure shown in the pictorial reproduction in the Black Panther newspaper," he said.
