Separatism Held Not Aim Of Negroes

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (AP)—A Negro educator said Wednesday that most black people "do not desire separatism" from whites but are determined to exert control in their communities and "be a part of the action."

Dr. Jerome H. Holland, president of Hampton Institute, Hampton, Va., and a one-time star athlete, said, "Some people are bewildered, yes, even frightened by this feeling among the black citizens."

But he said the black thrust for "community participation" is a natural reaction to their prolonged exclusion from institutional systems, and that it can be the key to wider cooperation.

Holland, a former Cornell University football player, spoke at the annual New York luncheon of the Salvation Army. He received its annual award as an "outstanding educator and citizen."

He "speaks a new principle for a new age," the citation said, adding that he "epitomizes an attitude of faith in God through service to man" that has made him a leader in the cause of "freedom, equality and justice for all."
