By JAMES R. POLK WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen-al: ate winner James L. Buckley of go New York got more than Tr \$400,000 in campaign cash of through false-front committees set up in Washington to conceal co who the donors were.

In one day alone, a quarter-ru million dollars was poured into cu the Conservative candidate's th third-party race through com-re r mittees with names like o' "League of Middle American N Women" and "Scientists for C t Sensible Solutions to Pollution."

The contributions were uncov-fered in a bulky report Buckley d filed voluntarily with the Sens ate. His campaign manager, David R. Jones, acknowledged the Washington committees were set up to hide the names of the donors.

"That's the only reason," Jones said.

Part of the money flowed from staunch Republicans, such as Wall Street bankers, who didn't want to alienate the GOP organization in power in New York by having their names linked publicly with Buckley, Jones said.

THREE-WAY RACE

Buckley won a three-way race with Democrat Richard L. Ottinger and incumbent Sen. Charles E. Goodell, a liberal Republican abandoned by the White House.

More than 50 committees were used in Washington by Buckley's campaign. In turn, they funneled the money into 100 other Buckley committees set up in New York. These 100 passed on the money the same day to Buckley's campaign.

No matter how much the amounts for the Washington contributions were varied, the total for each of the 100 committees added up to precisely \$3,000 every time.

Jones said the Buckley campaign used the method because a third-party ideological candidate doesn't have access to the usual party machinery and interest groups that bring in money for his opponents.

"You have to get money from the people who believe," Jones said.
