

Wallace-Bremer

- A member of George C. Wallace's presidential campaign staff said today the Milwaukee man held in the shooting of the Alabama governor was not a bona fide campaign worker.

"He's not part of the campaign," Frank Daniel said in reference to Arthur H. Bremer, 21, of Milwaukee, Wis. "I did recall seeing him, or someone just like him, at a campaign rally in Milwaukee. The hair style stuck in my mind."

Bremer has blond, short-cropped hair.

Daniel, an assistant to Wallace's chief campaign director, Charles Snider, said he does not recall seeking Bremer at any campaign rally except once in Wisconsin. "I'm sure the governor didn't know him," Daniel said. "I don't believe he did." The New York Daily News said Tuesday Bremer had been traveling with the Wallace campaign all week and had en-

deared himself to members of the governor's staff. The News attributed the story to an unidentified source.

Bremer, a short, stocky figure, was led into court by several U.S. marshals. He stood, hands clasped behind him, feet slightly apart in a posture resembling the military parade rest stance.

He grinned slightly before the proceedings began, but later adopted a more serious appearance when questioned by the magistrate.

He answered, "Yes I do," in a firm, strong voice when asked if he understood the nature of the charges. He shifted slightly from side to side, occasionally bringing his hands in front of him.

Throughout the midnight ap-

pearance, Bremer volunteered no statements, replying only with terse answers when questioned.

When Goetz asked if he was able to afford an attorney, Bremer replied: "No, I'm not, and I would not favor a court-appointed attorney."

Lipsitz then said Bremer wanted the ACLU to represent

him.

Goetz questioned Bremer to establish that he was unable to afford counsel.

"My worth is less than \$200 dollars," Bremer replied, saying the only property he owned was a motor vehicle.

U.S. Attorney George Beall recommended the \$200,000 bond because of the "nature and circumstances of the charges."

"The weight of the evidence against him is very strong," Beall said.

The federal attorney said the

weapon found on the scene was purchased by Bremer last Jan. 13 in Milwaukee.

Beall also said Bremer had been convicted for a misdemeanor after a charge of carrying a concealed weapon was reduced to a disorderly conduct, for which Bremer paid a \$25 fine last fall.
