

Bremer Trial Date ^{F Post} Set For July 17th ⁶⁻¹⁴⁻⁷²

BALTIMORE (AP) — A trial date of July 17 for Arthur H. Bremer on charges of shooting Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace and a Secret Service agent was set Tuesday by U.S. District Court Judge Edward S. Northrop.

Northrop scheduled the trial at the conclusion of a hearing at which he signed a modified order for psychiatric examinations for Bremer.

No decision has apparently been reached on whether the 21-year old Milwaukee man will first stand trial on federal or state charges.

Prince Georges County state's attorney Arthur Marshall earlier said July 12 was the tentative date for the state trial.

Bremer faces state and federal charges in connection with the shootings of Wallace and three other persons during a May 15 campaign appearance

at a Laurel, Md. shopping center.

A federal grand jury indicted Bremer on charges of assaulting a presidential candidate and a federal officer and for illegal transportation of a pistol across state lines.

The state indictment charged Bremer with six offenses in connection with the wounding of the four: attempted murder, assault and battery, assault with intent to murder, assault with intent to maim and two violations of the state handgun control law.

Northrop modified his order Monday on a motion by Benjamin Lipsitz, Bremer's court-appointed attorney. Northrop agreed that psychiatrists who examine Bremer will be prohibited from later testifying as to his guilt or innocence.
