# Wallace Victory Loss for Md. Labor

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Organized labor, rather than Hubert H. Humphrey or George McGovern, appeared yesterday to be the major loser in Tuesday's Maryland Democratic presidential primary, a contest won easily by Gov. George C. Wallace.

The state's AFL-CIO, 200,000 members strong and firmly for Humphrey, slated two labor representatives on each of the seven slates of national convention delegate candidates fielded by the Minnesota senator. None of the labor candidates won.

"It's clear that labor can produce money but not votes," said a disenchanted Humphrey strategist. "In Maryland for Humphrey they produced neither."

Labor made its push in the heavily blue-collar areas of Baltimore and Baltimore County and boasted before the election of the number of leaflets it distributed and the efficiency of its canvassing operation, but here, too, the AFL-CIO was shut out.

Labor's collapse was just one of the oddities in a contest that left many of the state's leading Democrats scratching their heads. To cite a few:

- Wallace won the state's conservative First Congressional District by a landslide, but the voters there elected the state's liberal

former senator, Joseph D. Tydings, as a convention delegate.

- Wallace won Prince George's County's Fifth Congressional District, but the McGovern delegate slate won five of the six convention spots on the ballot.

- Humphrey swept the nearly all-black Seventh Congressional District of Baltimore, but only one of his pledged delegates there was elected.

With virtually all but absentee ballots counted, Wallace took 39.2 per cent of the statewide vote. His victories in six congressional districts insured him 36 delegates to the national convention. His statewide victory gave him a bonus of five at-large delegates for a total of 41 of the 53 delegates Maryland will send to the convention.

Humphrey won the Seventh Congressional Dis-

trict's six delegates. McGovern won six by carrying Montgomery County's Eighth Congressional District.

Under Maryland law, the winner in a congressional district binds the district's delegates for two convention ballots, unless the candidate withdraws or fails to win more than 35 per cent of the convention vote on the first ballot.

Thus, the delegates bound to Wallace almost certainly will be free to vote for the candidate of their choice after the first convention ballot. Wallace, whose primary victories seem to be at an end, will probably have no more than 10 per cent of the convention delegates on the first ballot at Miami Beach in July.

In Maryland, only three delegates pledged to Wallace were elected, meaning that the Alabama governor's

41 delegates could be reduced to three after the first ballot. McGovern, however, managed to elect 16 delegates pledged to him, including all six of the winning delegates in the Eighth Congressional District. Five delegates pledged to Humphrey won election in various congressional districts.

But 24 of the delegates elected Tuesday ran as officially uncommitted. Many of these delegates are organization Democrats from the Baltimore area who are much more likely to go to Humphrey eventually than to McGovern.

In the Baltimore area's Second Congressional District, for instance, three of the six delegates elected ran on an unpledged slate supported by Baltimore County Executive Dale Anderson who came very close to endorsing Humphrey on Mon-

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day and previously had endorsed Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.).

Of the remaining three delegates in that District, one was supported by old-line political boss Jack Pollack, one ran as an independent and one is thought to support McGovern. All six will have to vote for Wallace on the first ballot.

Similarly, in the First Congressional District, where Wallace piled up his largest plurality, the voters there elected a totally uncommitted slate. The front-running delegate was Tydings, who at one time was one Sen. Edmund S. Muskie's strongest supporters in the state. Other winners in the First were Senate President William S. James (D-Harford), former Maryland Gov. J. Millard Tawes and

Del. Russell L. Hickman (D-Worcester).

The makeup of the Maryland delegation appears to insure the election of Gov. Marvin Mandel as an at-large delegate. The elected delegates, who will meet June 6 to choose the five-at-large delegates, are top-heavy with combined unpledged and Humphrey people, most of whom will support the governor. In addition, Mandel's press secretary, Frank A. DeFilippo, said the governor expected to also have the votes of McGovern's 16 delegates.

Many of the state's political observers credited the McGovern organization yesterday with disciplined voting. From the results, it appeared that McGovern's supporters also voted for his delegates while Humphrey

supporters either did not bother with the separate delegate contest of dissipated their votes on unpledged candidates. As for Wallace supporters, they only had 14 pledged delegate candidates to choose from and managed to elect three of them in the Fourth Congressional District (southern Prince George's and Anne Arundel), where the Alabama governor seemed to have his best organization.

Following are the unofficial winners in national convention delegate contests for the three congressional districts in the Washington area:

- Edward Charles Ahern, Jr., 33, an assistant manager in a vending machine company from Pasadena who was pledged to Humphrey.
  - Ise M. Drings, 32, a community organizer from Annapolis and former state president of the League of Women Voters, who was pledged to McGovern.
  - Warren S. Duckett Jr., 32, an Anne Arundel County councilman who was working for Muskie, now favours Humphrey but ran uncommitted.
  - Clifford G. Hardisty, 25, a truck driver from Annapolis who was one of

three candidates in the Fourth District who ran pledged to Wallace.

- Robert Paul Kiser, of Severna Park who was pledged to Wallace.
- David L. Siegert, 28, from Annapolis, who was pledged to Wallace.

#### Republicans

- Aris T. Allen, 51, a member of the Maryland House from Annapolis, who was one of the few Republican delegate candidates in the state who ran uncommitted to Nixon.
- Edward A. Potts, 47, from Camp Springs, an associate dean and professor at George Washington University Law Center, who said he was firmly supporting Nixon.

#### FIFTH DISTRICT

- Henry T. Arrington, 40, mayor-

elect of Seat Pleasant one of five of six McGovern-pledged delegates to win in the Fifth District.

- William A. Briggs, 28, a community action consultant pledged to McGovern.

● Kevin Patrick Dwyer, 35, a school psychologist from Bowie who was pledged to McGovern.

● Mary Louise Gober, 18, a student at Johns Hopkins University and youth coordinator for Prince George's County, pledged to McGovern.

● Royal Hart, 46, Prince Georges councilman pledged to McGovern.

● Winfield M. Kelly Jr., 36, chairman of the Prince George's County Council

who was pledged to Humphrey — the only candidate to break through the McGovern slate.
