WALLACE CALLED  
CONTACT AIDE

MONTEAGUE, Ala., Oct. 24 (AP)—One of Gov. George Wallace's campaign aides says that Arthur H. Bremer, the man convicted of shooting Mr. Wallace, worked in the governor's presidential campaign headquarters in Montgomery for a month last spring.

Mr. Bremer, 21, says Grey Hodges of Montgomery shot Mr. Wallace on the day the Governor was scheduled to appear at a Democratic primary, but he did not try to shoot him. Mr. Wallace walked away from the motel lobby once he was later greeted campaign workers.

Mr. Hodges, in an interview with The Alabama Journal, said that Bremer, 21, years old, "didn't act a bit out of the way, he was quiet, but he was a darn good worker."

Mr. Hodges said the shooting was planned by Bremer and a group of men who were active in the Alabama Citizens' Party, a group that has been active in the Wallace campaign.
