This was The most thorough, most well-written, most complete, collection of misinformation of everything written, about The Garrison investigation. He did not check out most of his tacts apparently just publishing at random every, sensational scrap of paper he could tind, and it evidently had Garrison's blessings. This, until your letter came, was The source of a, major part of my consternation.
