They reportedly acted after having received a memorandum, prepared at the direction of L. Patrick Gray 3d, who was then the bureau's acting director. The memorandum indicated the sensitivity of the investigation, which was reportedly producing disclosures potentially damaging and certainly embarrassing to the teamsters president, Frank E. Fitzsimhons, the Nixon Administration's stanchest ally within the labor movement.

The Administration's cultivation of the two-millionmember union culminated last year in a teamster endorsement of the President's reelection, and Mr. Nixon has made it clear that the door to his office is always open to Mr. Fitzsimmons.
