It is impossible for me to answer questions by mail now. If you are ever in this area, I'll take some time to try. In addition to all the other things that take time this winter my fingertips have been split and typing is also painful and more difficulty for me. And in today's mail alone there are eight letters in addition to yours.

I still have work I want to do and some things that I must do, like packaging books and shipping them. This past week I lost a day when I was driven to a Baltimore hospital for tests and a treatment, I had to go to the lab three times for blood testing and I had physical therapy three times, each taking two hours plus travel time. I've not had time to do the prescribed p.t. exercises in a month or more.

And at 78, despite my many health problems and limitations, I still put in a long day every day.

I also have a hearing problem so I sympathize with and understand yours.

If you decide to call, please remember that I must be abed by 8. I can't help waking early, very early.

Because we both have hearing problems it might not be satisfactory but unless you are here it is all that is now possible for me.

I want to re-emphasize the fact that I would never want to be a bother to you - but I cannot help but feel that you are the only person that has tried to go about this in the right way - so that is why I hope that I can get your opinions and answers to these questions.

Lastly, I am enclosing a SASE for you to mail back to me any correspondence, I do hope that I will have the oppurtunity to talk with you again soon. I do want to send you and your wife my best wishes for a happy and healthy 1992!
