Over the years I've said pretty much what I think can be said responsibly in the books I've published. I do not want to mislead anyone on this subject, which I believe gets to the integrity of our society.


I'll enclose a list of the books.

The crime itself was never really investigated officially. It therefore is impossible for private citizens to begin an investigation with so cold a trail and with so few, if any real clues left to be followed.

I am aware of most if not all the theorizing and alleged solutions and I do not know of any one I cannot fault. If others want to go that way, that is their option and their right.

My own view is that if we mislead and misinform the people as the government did we, too, fail in our obligations and we, too, are irresponsible.
