> EDITOR'S NOTE – Academy Award-winning director Oliver Stone has been accused of souttling history with his latest movie, "JFK." The plot has been shrouded in secrecy, but the vexing subject the movie tackles still seduces many to the scene of a president's assassination.

DALLAS (AP) -- Dealey Plaza is much the same today as it was 28 years ago, but the events that happened there changed the rest of us in ways we'll never know. Visitors trek to this spot on the west end of downtown as if to a shrine.
