They include only those of the witness's words the FBI obose to record and reflect only what the agents wanted recorded of answers to questions they chose to ask. In this case, as in the other, what Horer sent the Commission is not the original handwritten statement but a typed copy. This need involve no deceit, for instead of the signatures, the names are typed in following the mark; "/s/".
