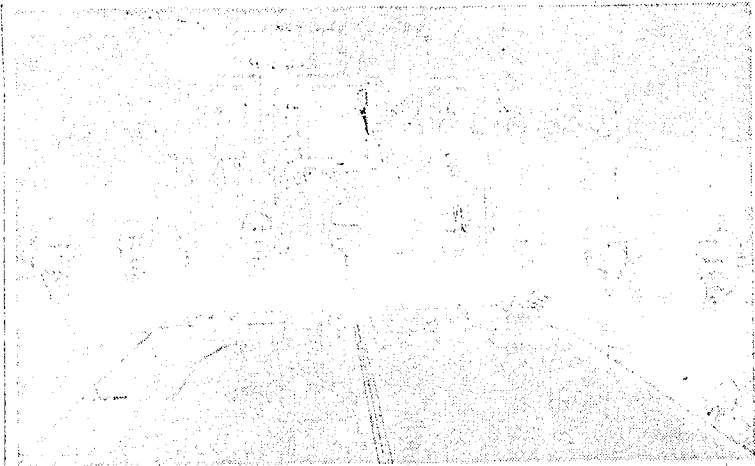

CBS Report 'Duped' Consultant

To the Editor: On the evening of March 2, on a Twin Cities radio program, I made what was probably the first public announcement of the recent CBS Special on the Warren Report. I mentioned that I was a consultant for that documentary and said it would be an impartial look at the facts surrounding the assassination.

In the past few days, numerous individuals who have read both the Warren Report and my articles on the assassination in the Star have approached me with the flat assertion that the CBS program had not dealt with the principle objections to the Warren Report. I could only reply that I was in full agreement with them.

I and many other critics of the Warren commission, helped gather background material for that program in exchange for the promise that it would be an attempt to impartially submit the evidence to the public. We were duped. It is with sincere regret that I admit the small part I unwittingly played in CBS's dishonest presentation of carefully selected evidence under the guise of "objectivity."

During the two years following the assassination, no network radio or TV program allowed dissent from the government's findings. CBS even canceled the televising of a debate between Warren Report critic Mark Lane and noted attorney Melvin Belli. The Canadian Broadcasting Co. was sufficiently disturbed about the situation to pre-empt programs about the assassination into the northernmost United States in the manner of Radio Free Europe.

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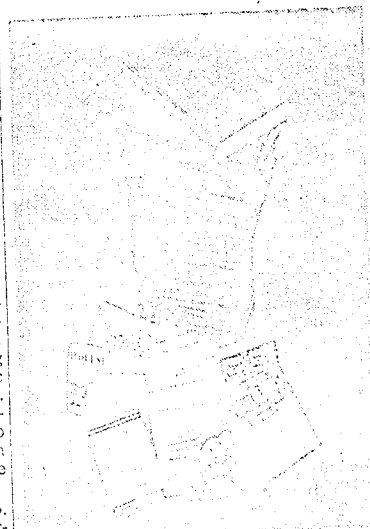
