Your letter came when I was in the hospital with a bad case of phlebitis. I've been home less than 2 days & spend almost all my time on my back. I respond when it is awkward and other things I should do go because your letter seemed sincere and because of the high regard I have for you & your professionalism.

When you did not send the CBS suit papers as you said you would from your car in a Xerox & delivered them to me on his way to keeping an ~~out~~ out-of-town lecture engagement for me. I read them never with the full use of both hands and mostly with no use at all of the one with which I write. When my left-handed efforts were atrocious as they were illegible I switched to just making marginal marks.

If you really do want to discuss this I'm willing. But unless I have this judged you badly I encourage you strongly not to until after the show is an ad. I say this in your interest. Mine is a better survival ~~when~~ when there is so little else I can do. Frankly, I have difficulty believing that you read and fully understood those papers.

By now you know a little about me & the way I thought with, if not as clearly for help what motivates me, which is not unusual in your industry. So I suggest that if & when you do want to discuss this, let us both have the same paper before us. I will be specific as I would not be when I write. Rather, who was not courteous enough to respond.

Until then, it should be obvious that one who has anything to sell, most of all books on a topical subject, does not reject coast-to-coast prime time TV attention without awareness that the decision is costly. Unless you think Jim crazy, can I be other than sincere?

On questions of accuracy of perception, soundness of (impersonal) judgement as well as principle I will face any confrontation, including the utterly improbable, CBS' stable of lawyers. Can it be that TV people are stunned - offended - that there remains one who regards other considerations as more important than being on TV?

How can I explain Rather's discourtesy & bad manners? I was courteous to him & all of you. I let him/all of you know immediately. I took time in which I am not paid to treat CBS decently.
