



Sane Asks Equal Time

CBS NEWS didn't exactly panic this week after receiving a demand for "equal time" from the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy.

The telegram was prompted by last Tuesday's CBS News program with former President Eisenhower and Gen. Omar N. Bradley. The Committee invoked the FCC's "Fairness Doctrine" and requested equal time "to present alternative views on Vietnam of retired military leaders such as Gens. Matthew Ridgeway, James Gavin, David Shoup and Adm. Arnold True."

Richard S. Salant, president of CBS News, said: "We've been trying to get those fellows for some time. Gen. Ridgeway has been out of the country. Gen. Shoup said 'no' to our request."

He thought something could be arranged, if Sane supplies the guests.

Strictly as a matter of corporate procedure, Salant said the telegram from Sane's acting executive director, Sanford Gottlieb, has been forwarded to the network's legal department. (CBS has filed a suit in Chicago, questioning the legality of the FCC's "Fairness Doctrine" under the First Amendment.)

And, as a matter of form, Salant was certain that CBS News has already satisfied the FCC requirements. He said many of the persons who oppose the U.S. position in Vietnam had already appeared on CBS News programs.
