Staggers Verges House To Cite CBS United Press International Declaring that network tele

Declaring that network television has the capacity to mavision has the capacity to ma-nipulate elections, Rep. Harley O. Staggers (D-W. Va.), urged the House yesterday to ap-prove contempt of Congress charges against CBS President Frank Stanton and the CBS network for defying a demand for unused film from a news decumentary.

A vote on the unprece-dented attempt to cite a network for contempt is expected next week — probably Tuesday. Approval could prompt Justice Department prosecution and eventually a supreme

court confrontation.
In a 2,700-word letter and statement to all House members, Staggers, who is chairman of the Commerce Committee, said the "American viewing public" bases its votes on information it obtains from its "most prominent news

source — the television set.

"The raw naked power to manipulate by gross fabrication the input data is the power to manipulate, however well intentioned, the design making process of the cision-making process of the American electorate."

CBS has claimed that the unshown film from the docu-mentary, "The Selling of the Pentagon," is the equivalent of a reporter's notes and is protected from subpoena by the First Amendment.
