
Waller advises me that a communication has been sent to Helms describing the article and providing him with a memory refresher should he feel compelled to comment on the allegation.

This is another example where material provided to the press and public in response to an FOIA request is exploited mischievously and in distorted form to make the headlines.

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Document Contradicts Testimony

CIA Viewed Oswald As Information Source

Contrary to sworn testimony, the CIA once considered using presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald as a source of intelligence information about the Soviet Union, according to a newly released CIA document.

In sworn testimony before the Warren Commission, former CIA-Director Richard Helms said the agency never had "or even contemplated" any contacts with Oswald.

The newly released document, written by an unidentified CIA officer three days after President John F. Kennedy was killed in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963, says that "we showed intelligence interest" in Oswald and "discussed... the laying on of interviews."

The unidentified officer added that I do not know what action developed thereafter.

THE MEMO WAS AMONG hundreds of pages of documents from the CIA's file on Lee Harvey Oswald. The material was released to The Associated Press yesterday under the Freedom of Information Act.

A second document reveals that former CIA Director Allen Dulles, while serving as a member of the Warren Commission, privately counseied CIA officials on the best way to answer questions from the commission about allegations that Oswald was a CIA seent.

Dulies "thought language which made it clear that Lee Harvey Oswald was never an employe or agent of CIA would suffice," an unidentified CIA officer wrote Helms in April

"I agree with him that a carefully phrased denial of the charges of involvement with Oswald seemed most appropriate," the unidentified officer. added.

When he appeared before the commission in May 1964, Helms, then head of the agency's clandestine services, testified under oath that "there's no material in the Central Intelligence Agency, either in the records or in the mind of any of the individuals that there was any contact had or even comtemplated with" Oswald.

THE NOV. 25, 1961, memo explains that the agency's interest in Oswald as a potential intelligence source was due to his "unusual behavior in the USSR," to which he had defected in 1359.

"We were particularly interested in the (deleted) Oswald might provide on the Minsk factory in which he had been employed, on certain sections of the city itself, and of course we thought the usual (deleted) that might help develop (deleted) personality dossiers," the memo states.

The memo indicates that Oswald was also of interest to the CIA because of concern that his Russian-

born wife, Marina, might have been part of a trend for Soviet women to marry foreigners, leave the country and settle overseas where they could serve as spies.

THE MEMO ABOUT the agency's interest in Oswald said the discussions about Oswald occurred "sometime in summer 1960." The author continued: "I don't recall if this was discussed while Oswald and his family were en route to our country or if it was after their arrival."

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

THE SAME SOURCE SAID INVESTIGATORS ALSO WERE UNABLE TO CONFIRM THE SPORM TESTIMONY BEFORE THE SUBCOMMITTEE BY A FORMER CIR OFFICER HHO CLAIMED TO HAVE SEEN A CIR REPORT CONCERTING A CONTACT WITH A MAN CLOSELY RESERBLING USWALD'S DESCRIPTION.

THE OSWALD DOCUMENT RELEASED BY THE CIR UNDER A FREEDOM OF EXFORMATION RET REQUEST WAS MRITTEN BY AN UNIDENTIFIED CIR OFFICER NO RECALLED THAT " WE SHOWED INTELLIGENCE INTEREST" IN USUALD AND

Professed the LAVING ON OF INTERVIEWS."

THE UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER, WHO WROTE THE MENO THREE DAYS AFTER KENNEDY WAS HILLED IN DALLAS ON NOV. 22, 1953, ADDED THAT HE WAS TRANSFERRED TO ANOTHER ASSIGNMENT AND **1 DO NOT KHOW WHAT ACTION DEVELOPED THEREAFTER. **

ACCORDING TO THE SOURCE, SUBCOMMITTEE INVESTIGATORS INTERVIEWED THE OFFICIAL WITH WHOM THE UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER DISCUSSED THE POSSIBILITY OF CONTACTING USWALD.

"NOTHING EVER CAME OF IT; " THE SOURCE SAID ADDING THAT A SEARCH OF ABENCY FILES TURNED UP "NO PAPERNORK THAT ANY FOLLOW-UP ACTION WAS TRKEN; " TO CONTACT USHALD.

Similarly, the source said investigators "found no documents", that would have corroborated the testimony of the former CIA officer who said he recalled seeing a report indicating the agency description ex-Marine who had norked in a radio factory in Minsk - a description which exactly fits Uswald.

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THIS SOURCE DISCOUNTED THE POSSIBILITY THAT THE CLA MIGHT HAVE COVERED UP ANY DEALINGS IT HAD WITH OSWALD; SAYING; (SOMERODY MOULD HAVE HAD TO MAKE A CONSCIOUS EFFORT TO ALTER DOCUMENTS.);

THE BRIEF STATEMENT RELEASED BY SCHWEIKER GAVE NO INDICATION OF THE BASIS FOR HIS CONTINUING SUSPICION.

ALLEGATIONS THAT OSHALD was IN SOME HAY WORKING FOR THE CIR HAVE BEEN CIRCULATING SINCE 1963 AND HAVE BEEN DISCOUNTED BY CIR OFFICIALS AS PART OF A COMMUNIST PROPAGANDA CAMPAIGN.

When Helms appeared before the Karren Commission in May 1964, he testified under oath that "There is no material in the Central Intelligence Agency either in the records or in the mind of any of the individuals, that there was any contact had or even contemplated with thin.

AT THE TIME OF HIS TESTIMONY, PELMS WAS BEAD OF THE AGENCY'S CLANIESTINE SERVICES.

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
