
SUBJECT : Police Training

1. This memorandum is for information only and is in response to your request for a resume of Agency sponsored training for domestic police departments arranged by the Office of Security.
2. Since May 1970, the following training has been conducted:
 - a. In May 1970, a 3-day seminar was held at [REDACTED] for high-ranking officers of police departments from Washington, D. C., Boston, Massachusetts, Montgomery County, Maryland, and Arlington and Fairfax Counties, Virginia. The seminar included briefings on audio countermeasures techniques, explosive devices, and foreign ordnance;
 - b. During 1970-1971, a number of contacts with various domestic police departments were made relative to briefings and demonstrations of the Trace Metal Detection Technique;
 - c. On 15-16 April 1971, a demonstration of the Explosive Residue Detection Technique was conducted at [REDACTED] for police officers representing departments from Boston, Chicago, Miami, Los Angeles, New York, San Francisco, Richmond, and the Washington, D. C., metropolitan area;
 - d. During the period 17 July - 4 August 1972, the Office of Security afforded tutorial training in [REDACTED]

lock manipulation, photography, and physical surveillance to a total of 20 police officers from Washington, D. C., Arlington and Fairfax Counties, Virginia, and Montgomery and Prince Georges Counties, Maryland, police departments. These courses were given at Agency facilities [REDACTED]

e. From 11-14 September 1972, twelve officers from the New York City Police Department attended an [REDACTED] structured training course given at [REDACTED]. The course dealt with basic theories of intelligence, clandestine collection methodology, the analytical function, and security's role in the intelligence effort.
