During the past several days, the press has revealed one vie lation after another of this street about the use of CIA data by other agencies such as the FBI and Secret Service.

Two years ago, we reported that the CIA had provided the Secret Service with sex gossip about singer Eartha Kitt after she made an unfavorable re mark about the Vietnam war at a White House luncheon. We omitted her name because were unable to reach her to get permission to quote what the secret CIA report said about her.

Richard M. Helms, then the CIA director, personally assured us that the Kartha Kitt report-was an exception and that the CIA had uncovered information about her in the course of an overseas investigation.

But we have now learned that the CIA funneled information through the FBI to the Justice Department's civil disturbance unit about hundreds of active or potential demonstrators. The information was requested by the Justice Department, which turned over 9,000 names to the CIA for checking against Americans who had attended overseas peace conferences.

The CIA's role in furnishing information about potential demonstrators was confirmed by a senior Justice Department official and a former assistant attorney general, whose names

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
