The litigation was initiated as part of a project sponsored being handled by attorneys jointly by the nonprofit Cen-John Shattuck, William Dobrojointly by the nonprofit Center for Nazonal Security Stud--with which Halperin is affiliated—and the American Civ li Lberties Unio. halperin also is suing for damages for the wiretapping of his homt telephone during reporters on the Vladivostok the Nixon administration.

At a press conference yesterday, Halperin said the CIA has acknowledged it is subject to the new reedom of Information Act by making a few documents public in response to his requests.

One CIA memo, which Halperin released yesterday, shows that the agency's Do-mestic Operations Division was set up in 1963 under instructions likening it to a CIA "foreign field station."

"The future establishment of subordinate domestic bases is envisioned," Richard Helms, then-deputy director for CIA plans, said in the Feb. 11, 1963. memorandum.

> Halperin, acting as his own attorney, filed a fourth complaint against Secretary of State Kissinger for portions of two background briefings for strategic arms limitation talks. Kissinger held the briefings last fall, and the State Department has refused to release some of the information.
