**Central Intelligence Agency** Director William E. Colby gave the Senate committee on intelligence operations a secret briefing yesterday on the CIA's cladestine activities since its inception in 1947.

Testifying under oath, Colby spent nearly two hours before the committee in the windowless, eavesdropproof chambers of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy at the Capitol. He decline to comment on leaving.
