Congress probers to get secrets

WASHINGTON — To determine whether the Central Intelligence Agency was involved in alleged assassination plots against foreign leaders, President Ford has drawn on his sports background and snapped the ball to the attorney general and congressional investigating committees.

The President will act on some 30 recommendations made in a report by the Rockefeller commission on CIA domestic activities which is to be released Tuesday evening.

But on the more controversial charges of conspiracy to commit murder. Ford says he will not sit in judgment on the actions of past Presidents going back to Dwight D. Eisenhower, on "decisions made by honorable people under unusual circumstances."

IN A NEWS conference Mon-

day devoted mainly to me consissue, the President said he would not make public the incomplete inquiry into political assassinations conducted by an eight-member commission headed by Vice President Nelson Rockefeller.

The allegations, Ford said, involve "extremely sensitive matters" and it would not be in the public interest if the material relating to them were made public "at this time." He
